Wallace Says High.—From the Sun comes this report, which is intensely interesting in this valley.

Prof. C. A. Thompson. head of the Smith-Staples department in the Wallawalla high school has just received the findings of the boys in his agricultural class who took the test on general cereal crops last spring. This test was sent out by the state college at Corvallis to all Smith-Staples agricultural groups over the state, many of the thirty schools being represented.

By their rating the Wallawalla group stands unusually high, the norm of this group being three points higher than the norm for the state.

Two of the boys made unusually high scores. Tim Wilkins making 121 out of a possible 125 points and Phil C. Smith making 118 out of the 125.

Tim Wilkins, ranked third with 88. The norm for the class was 78 while the norm for the state was 72. There were 18 boys who took the test for Wallawalla.

Only Standards Fail to Drop In Butter Market

PORTLAND, Dec. 12 (P)—Cut of 10 in the price of all cube butter except standards on the produce exchange for the late season, indicated that another attempt was being made to hold down values on the top score offerings. Local co-ops are members of the exchange but appear powerless to do anything to aid the price of \$1 scores and better.

The fact that both standards and extras are quoted at the same price indicates that the public does not know the difference between the scores.

There was no change in the price of butterfat for the week-end session of the exchange. No. 1 is quoted 33-34 with No. 2, 30-31 1/2.

Market for eggs continues to reflect more or less weakness in the country generally. There was no further change announced by the Pacific co-ops but some others are showing their values.

Very slow trading time is continued in the market for live chickens with buyers generally offering 15c for heavy birds, 14c for medium and 13c for light. Commission men are looking for better for the former two.

Continued slack trading is continuing in the market for onions at the source. The result of lack of offerings by the country since the buying price advanced to \$3 with sacks and time furnished by buyers.

Buyers of carload lots paid up to \$30 a ton for cabbage during the last 24 hours at local points, a sharp rise of \$3 from the previous day. Outside demand continues favorable.

Very weak trading time is continued in the market for country killed calves with little business beyond the low point. Hogs are just steady. Lambs in big supply, continue weak.

without a mechanic, a feat rarely undertaken at this season.

Miss Foltz is the only woman in the northwest to receive a transport license. Her use to date has not spoiled the little airplane, and she never takes chances merely for the benefit of her audience although she is willing to do so for the sake of aviation, which is coming along rapidly as a mode of transportation.

Miss Foltz is leaving a splendid trail of honors behind her. In 1929 she placed second in the women's race from Cleveland to Santa Monica, and in 1930 she placed fourth, making the second and third place by only a fraction of a point. She was second throughout the entire race until the last 30 miles, the states, and then became confused in a storm, losing her bearings for a short while. Her place as second in the race was lost, although many newspapers credited her with it.

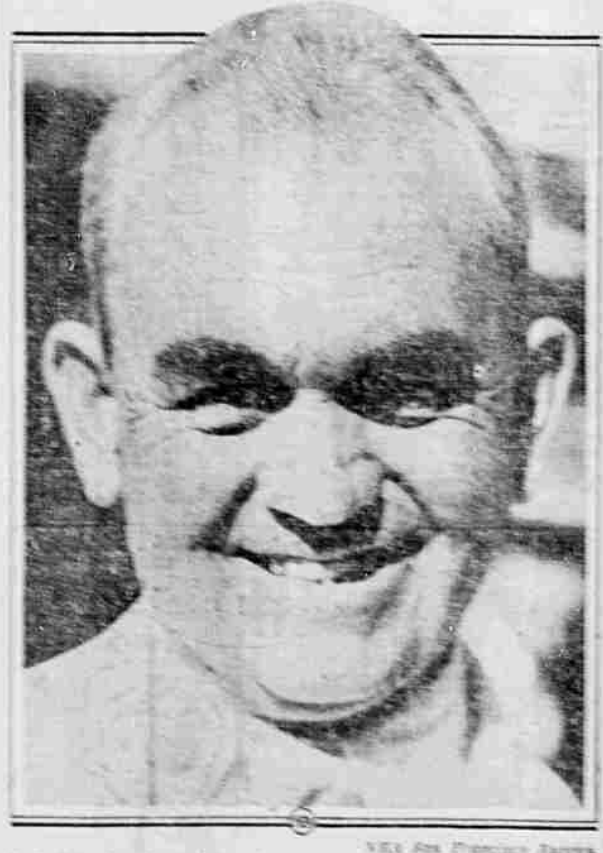

NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (P)—The stock market was boosted by short covering in the last few minutes of trading today, after sinking into new low ground.

Losses of 1 to 2 points were cancelled or reduced in the final upturn, and several issues closed with gains of fractions to a point. The closing time was steady.

Transfers approximated 1,500,000 shares for the two-hour session.

WOOL MARKET
BOSTON, Dec. 12 (P)—Wool prices were mostly steady through the past week when trade slackened noticeably, as compared with the previous week. A little uncertainty existed as to values of the poorer type of wools and finer domestic wools but good fine wools sold at firm prices. Business on the lower grades was rather scattered except on 40-50's quality which were moderately active at steady prices.
