  - Breakfast
  - Orange Juice

  - Dixie Shortcake
  - Escalloped Potatoes

  - Bread Plum Jam
  - Fruit Salad

  - Fruit Ice Box Cookies
  - 1 cup fat
  - 3 cups dark brown sugar
  - 2 tablespoons cream.

- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup chopped figs
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 4 1/2 cups flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons soda
- Cream the fat and sugar. Add cream and eggs. Beat 3 minutes. Add rest of the ingredients and shape into two rolls 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Wrap in waxed paper and chill 12 hours or longer. Cut off thin slices and bake 2 inches apart on greased baking sheets.
- Dixie Shortcake
- 2 cups flour
- 4 tablespoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 5 tablespoons fat
- 1 egg
- 2-3 cup milk
- Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in fat with knife. Mixing with knife, add egg and milk. When soft dough forms, pat it out until 2-3 inch thick. Cut into 6 squares. Bake 12 minutes on greased baking pan in moderate oven. Split and add the filling. Replace the tops and serve.
- Filling
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons chopped onions
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 2-3 cup chopped ham
- Melt butter and add flour. Blend well and add salt and pepper. Add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add rest of ingredients.

## QUAL THICK IN OKLAHOMA FROM RESTOCKING PROGRAM

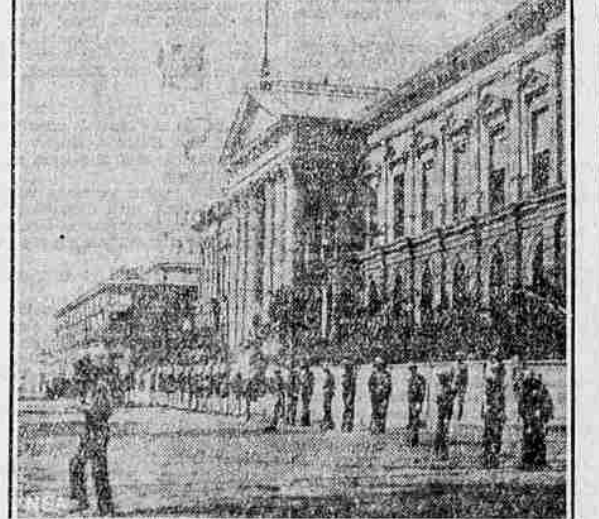

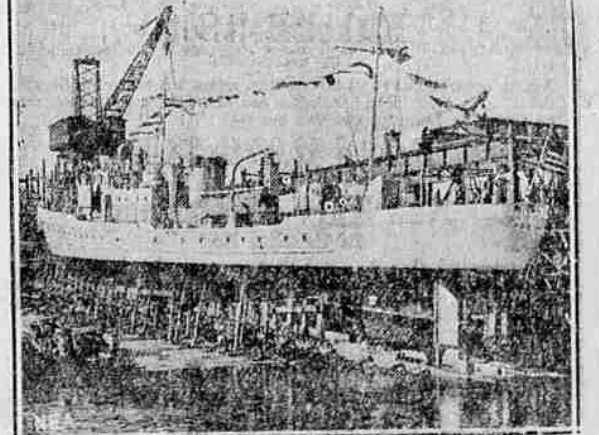

## Where San Salvador Revolt Raged

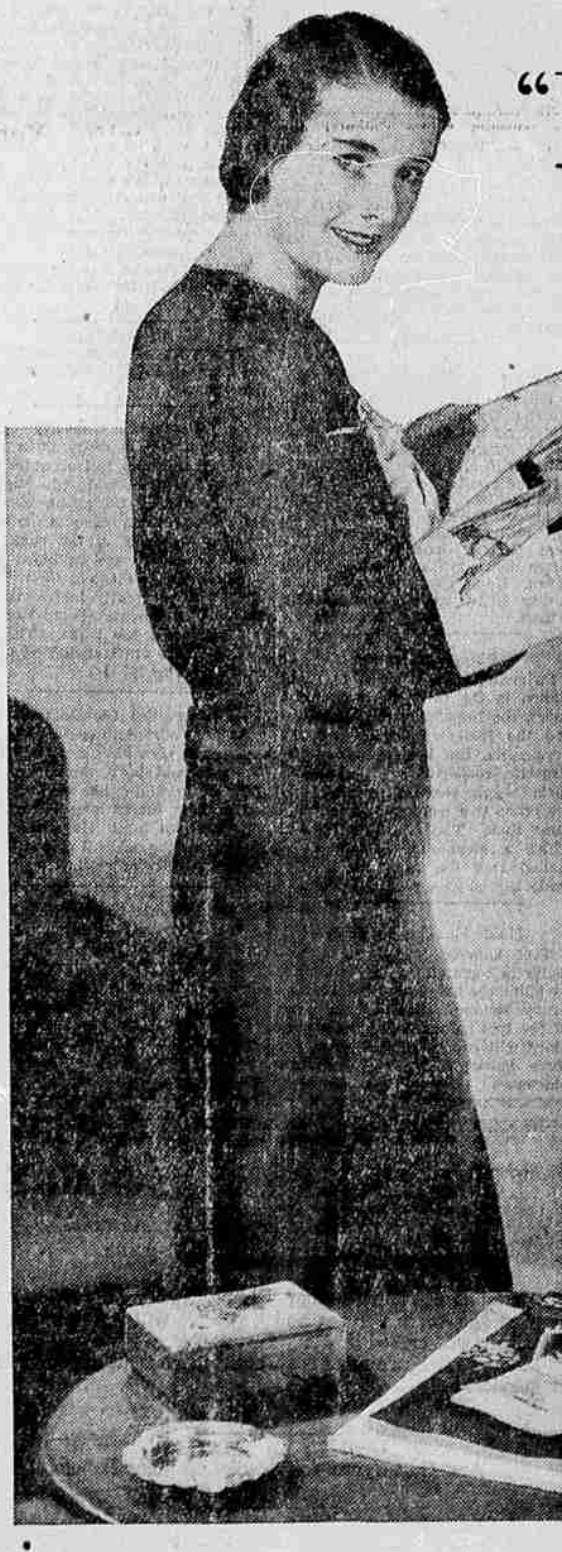

Rum runners, beware! Here's the speedy, cruiser-like type of patrol boats which will go into coast guard service soon. This rakish vessel pictured under construction at Bath, Me., is 165 feet long. Twin diesel engines will drive it at a speed of more than 16 knots. Twin propellers and twin rudders will enable it to turn and execute trick maneuvers of navigation with great speed. Seven boats of this type are being built.
