The entire support of the 13 western foes of Moses went to Vandenberg, including Blaine and LaFollette, of Wisconsin; Borah and Thomas, of Idaho; Brookhart of Iowa; Capper of Kansas; Couzens of Michigan; Cutting of New Mexico; Frazier and Nye, of North Dakota; Howell and Norris, of Nebraska and Jones, of Washington.

Senator Shipstead, Farmer-Labor of Minnesota, voted for Norris.
The second and third ballots showed the same results.

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propriety," Beck said. "Mr. Hoover proposed the moratorium."
"In this matter of international affairs, let's forget politics. Let's agree with the president. He may be wrong but he at least will have the comfort of knowing the country is behind him."

"If this house, by its failure to agree to forbearance in this question, destroys the ability of foreign governments to pay not only these debts but their others, it will have inflicted a punishment on this country that compares with the present economic condition like a cyclone storm compared with a spring squall."

"The American people have consented to all the cancellation they should consent to," he said.
"Let us not be guilty of giving them credit to continue their vast armaments."

Dill said no other international proposal had been so completely rejected by members of congress for many years.

The Washington senator said after reading Secretary Mellon's explanation of the president's recommendation, he was "convinced it was a proposal to balance the British budget."
"It said, he added, 'that owing to depreciation of the British pound it would be necessary for Great Britain to pay about 50 per cent more pounds on her debt and recommended this should be cut down so that England could be required to pay no more pounds.'"

SILVER BILL DRAFTED
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Senator Smoot's silver bill drafted for introduction today follows:
"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that at the request of any foreign government the secretary of the treasury is authorized and directed to accept, in payment of the whole or any part of the indebtedness now or hereafter owing to the government of the United States by such foreign government, silver at the average market price in the United States for the second calendar month preceding date of payment."

JOHNSON MAKES DEMAND
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—A resolution calling upon the administration to give the senate all notes and papers exchanged with foreign governments relating to the Manchurian dispute was introduced today by Senator Johnson, Republican, California.

ASKS FOR INVESTIGATION
WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Power for the senate agriculture committee to resume the investigation of prices it started last session was sought today by Chairman McNary. The investigation was designed to determine whether retail prices of wheat, meat and sugar had declined in comparison with the wholesale prices.

FOUR SAILORS ESCAPE
CONSTANTINE, Algeria, Dec. 14 (AP)—Four sailors attached to the French submarine chaser No. 6, on coast guard duty here, turned up today after having been cast ashore from the wreckage of a ship that broke away while under tow in a fierce storm Saturday.

The men were left on the beach by the sea and made their way to safety. The bodies of two members of the crew who were drowned have been recovered. Seven are missing.

SURVIVORS ARRIVE
SPEZIA, Italy, Dec. 14 (AP)—One hundred survivors of the wreck of the Italian naval tug Teseo, which sank yesterday in a storm off the coast of Sardinia, with the loss of at least 30 lives, arrived here today aboard the cruiser Trieste. Nineteen others came in on the Pieve. They were not permitted to recount the story of the disaster.

China Old in History
Actual historical records exist in China from about 2205 B. C., commencing with the Hsia dynasty, but fixed dates exist from the commencement of the Chou dynasty founded by Wu Wang about 1106 B. C.

Savannah Theater Oldest
The oldest operating theater in the United States is the Savannah theater in the Georgia city of the same name. It first opened its doors on December 4, 1818.—Pathfinder Magazine.

defendants in the assault case, and the beating of Robert K. Wong, a Chinese who was mistaken by the mob for one of the defendants. Ida was kidnapped by about 20 men, taken to the opposite side of Oahu island, whipped with a trower's belt, beaten and left lying beside the road where passing motorists found him.

He said his abductors threatened to hang him or throw him over Nuuanu fall, a 1200-foot precipice.

Ida, recovering at his home from the beating, said he could identify two of his kidnapers. Police were searching for them.

Unsafe For Women
Last Friday Rear Admiral George T. Pettengill, commanding mincrafs of the fourteenth naval district, announced he had warned Admiral Richard H. Leigh, commander of the battle force, United States fleet, that Honolulu was unsafe for naval officers' wives.

Rear Admiral Yates Stirling, commander of Pearl harbor, asserted a certain portion of the city's population refused to take assaults upon women seriously, and added that the city could expect such attacks until "the better element gets to work to stamp out this condition."

The alleged assault for which the five men were tried recently, occurred September 12. The case was declared a mistrial.
Rear Admiral Stirling said late last night he was sending a message to Admiral William V. Pratt, chief of naval operations, giving details of the weekend's disturbances. He declared he was not making any recommendations, but added neither was he contradicting Rear Admiral Pettengill's warning that Honolulu is unsafe for wives of navy officers.

Admiral Stirling said the situation here is serious, but not serious enough to cause concern at Washington.

Cause of Heat Lightning
Heat lightning is due to the reflection from distant clouds of far-off flashes, the thunder being too far away to be heard. The weather bureau says, however, that it is possible for an electric discharge through the air to build up more or less gradually from a burst discharge to a full flow, and such a discharge would produce little or no thunder.

"Stiffness" and "Strength"
Stiffness of a material often is confused with strength. Tests on steel rails for instance, show that in the case of the new 132 pound rail adopted by an eastern railroad, the addition of 22 pounds in weight increased the stiffness of the rail 75 per cent but its breaking strength only 40 per cent.—Popular Mechanics Magazine.

"Castles in Spain"
The origin of the expression "Castles in Spain," is said to have been the fact that fashionable adventurers in France used to impose on the creditors and get money and social advantages out of them by telling tales of their castles in Spain, which, needless to say, they did not possess.

Formed by Lightning
Fulgurites are the glassy formations sometimes called lightning tubes, due to the fusion of loose sand along the path of a lightning discharge in the earth. The inner surface is of smooth glass, while the outer consists of rough, incompletely fused particles of sand. They are found of various sizes, some of several inches in diameter, and in some cases extend more than 25 feet into the ground.

Year's Hottest Season
Dog days comprise the hot, sultry season of summer during parts of July and August; so called from the fact that the rising of the dog star, Sirius, the brightest star in the heavens, is coincident with the rising of the sun. The ancients thought this conjunction caused the intense heat of summer and the maladies which then prevailed, hence the popular supposition that dogs are likely to go mad at this season.

Sanskrit Long Used
Cuneiform inscriptions of western Asia indicate that Sanskrit has been the main language of Hindu literature, religion and culture for upwards of 3,500 years. It has been changed slightly in time, but remains substantially the same now as in the first records we have of it. The language of the Vedas differs from current Sanskrit about as Homeric Greek differs from Attic Greek.

Sanskrit's High Place
Sanskrit is regarded as the most important and highly organized of historic languages. It is full and flexible, and has a broad range of grammatical construction. Its discovery in the eighteenth century was the most important happening in the whole history of eastern culture. The study of this language opened up the primitive Indo-European period, and originated the science of philology.

Losses Caused by Fog
There are no general statistics as to what extent fog interferes with shipping, but a specific example that may be cited is that of a dense fog that hung for five days over the English channel. No serious accident resulted, but the time lost by vessels laid up in the Thames estuary alone was estimated to be worth \$5,000,000.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Dr. Horace M. Patton, 63, understood to be the first man in the United States to be awarded a life membership in the United Spanish war veterans, died early Sunday at his home here from a heart attack. He was apparently in good health when he retired Saturday night.

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 14 (AP)—Miss Jane Addams, "Had a good night and is doing well."

In this terse bulletin Dr. Thomas S. Cullen described the condition this morning of the noted Chicago settlement worker and co-winner of this year's Nobel peace prize, on whom he performed an abdominal operation at Johns Hopkins hospital last Saturday.

DISTURBANCE IN FEDERAL PRISON

(Continued from Page One)

E. H. Eckholdt, secretary to Warden T. B. White, wounded Friday by one

of seven prisoners who abducted him and escaped from the penitentiary, said the disturbance had not extended throughout the convict population.

Eckholdt said the convicts were quiet this morning but had not been permitted to go to work until the disturbance was investigated and the "attitude of the prisoners" became known to authorities.

To Investigate Break
Sanford Bates, director of federal prisons, arrived here this morning from Washington to investigate Friday's sensational prison break.

There are 700 to 800 convicts in cellhouse "B" where the disturbance took place. They and occupants of the other three cellhouses were confined to their cells and not permitted to go to breakfast this morning. Officials said it had not been decided whether to let them go to the dining room for the noon meal.

While the prisoners were confined, Bates was in conference with Fred Zerbst, warden of the penitentiary annex who now also is in charge of the main prison while Warden White is in the hospital.

Thayer Still at Large
With three of the convicts dead, prison executives looked upon the three survivors who were recaptured as key witnesses in the inquiry. Peace officers were on the lookout for Thayer, an Oklahoma mail train robber.

The other survivors, Stanley Brown, Charles Berta and Tom Underwood, confined incommunicado, face charges of prison break, punishable by a maximum penalty of five years additional imprisonment and \$1,000 fine.

Fred Zerbst, acting warden, said they also might be accused of complicity in assaults with intent to kill the warden, Thomas B. White, who was injured severely by a shotgun charge in a fight with his captors. Two guards also were wounded.

Green Named as Slayer
The bodies of the three men were found by posemen in the Emerson Salisbury farm house, eight miles west of here, have been claimed by relatives. At an autopsy William Green, Kansas City mail robber, was named as the slayer of his companions, Grover C. Durrill and George Curtis, and himself.

Warden White revealed a convict's threat to blow up the prison entrance had led him to issue the order releasing the seven convicts and seven hostages, among them the warden, to the outside.

The convicts, who trapped him at his office, were armed with explosives in addition to four revolvers, a
