Chats With Parents

To the young child one of the most fascinating tools in the house is the scissors in mother's work basket.

They are so bright and shiny, so interesting to handle.

They can be used to produce such marvelous results.

Left to his own devices, the three or four year old is bound to experiment with them. Usually he cuts up a brand new suit of clothes or mother's best table cloth in the process and perhaps hurts himself as well. Such calamities may readily be avoided by a little timely training.

As soon as the child shows interest in using the scissors he should be given a pair of his own. They should be of the regular kindergarten variety—small, easy to handle and blunt at the ends. He should be taught to use only his own scissors.

The child also should be given plenty of material to operate upon. Packs of kindergarten paper, in bright assorted colors, old magazines and wrapping paper are fine for this.

The little girl who wishes to emulate her mother's dress making activities can be given a little box of odds and ends of her own.

The possession of ribbons, bits of brightly colored material and lace will remove the child's temptation to tamper with mother's materials.

It is well also to teach the little child that he must carry all such things as scissors and knives with the points down so that he will be less likely to hurt himself should he fall.

He should learn to do this with his own harmless scissors so that the habit will be established when later on he graduates to the use of the regular kind.

'Farm Life's The Life For Me,' Says Young Prize Calf Raiser

(Editor's Note: Wendell Morgan, 16, of Aledo, Ill., fed the calf that won the grand championship in the junior-fed beef cattle competition from more than 200 entries at the International Livestock exposition in Chicago. His brother, Lawrence, exhibited the reserve champion. This is Wendell's own story of his cattle-raising "career.")

CHICAGO—They want me to write a story for the papers now, just because my good old "Coalie" was judged the best beef calf fed by any boy exhibiting in the big livestock show here.

Well, I reckon he was the best. He sure looks good to me. And I reckon my little brother Lawrence's "Artemis" was as close for second place as could have been found in the junior class.

They're both Aberdeen-Angus and half-brothers. Coalie was born a year ago last April and Artemis a year ago in September.

Lawrence named his calf after a favorite comic-page character of his; and you'd easily guess where Coalie got his name if you saw him—he's black as anthracite and just as solid. Lawrie and I were right there, working, when both the calves were born on our farm near Aledo, Ill., and we've had the whole care of them ever since, along with our other farming chores.

We get up at 4:30 each morning, and spend a couple hours then, and a couple hours every night after school, with the cattle. We carry them about twice a week, except when we're getting ready for shows, and then we dress them down every day.

It's about four miles into Aledo from our place. I'm a sophomore in the high school there, and I wanted to play on the basketball team, but I got hurt when I was six years old and the doctor says no violent athletics for me. So the next best thing, I figured, was to get into the prize cattle business.

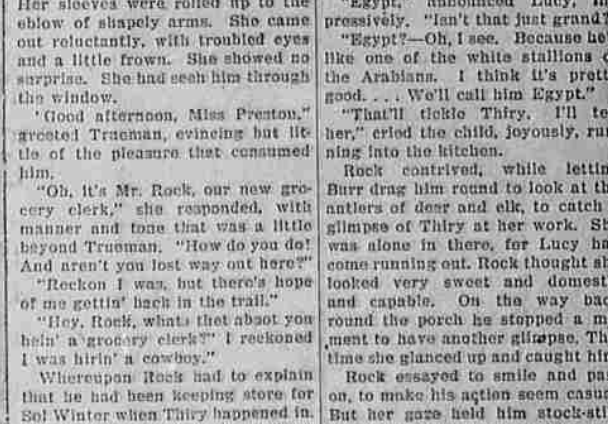
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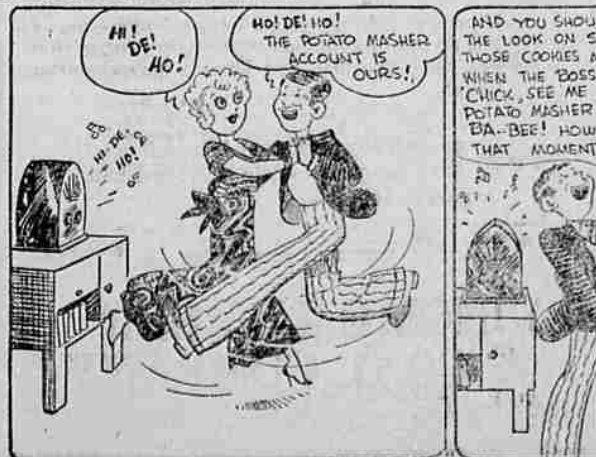
