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Fellow Townsfolk Forget Winnie Ruth Judd As She Awaits Trunk Murder Trial Alone

PHOENIX, Ariz., (A).—Winnie Ruth Judd, whose name was blazoned across front pages of newspapers from coast to coast a few weeks ago, no longer is even a topic of conversation among her fellow townspeople.

The slight, blond slayer of Agnes Le Roi and Hedvig Samuelson, sits alone in her jail cell here as the time nears when she will face a jury and hear the state of Arizona ask that she be adjudged a murderer and hanged within the adobe walls of the state prison at Florence.

She has said she killed in self defense during a quarrel. Her only visitors are her attorney and parents, Rev. and Mrs. H. J. McKinnell, of Darlington, Ind. here to be near until the trial is over, and her husband, Dr. W. C. Judd.

She has no other visitors because her fellow townsfolk are indifferent about her. "The Judd woman," as she became known to Phoenix, was a sensation, the chief topic of conversation for two weeks.

Courts were jammed at her preliminary appearances—but now her name is seldom mentioned. In the women's jail ward, the accused slayer of her two friends is just "another girl waiting for trial," but folded away in her cell is a roll of newspaper clippings that have proved to Ruth Judd that she is not just "another girl."

These carefully preserved daily records tell the story in words and pictures of how she shot and killed Mrs. Le Roi and Miss Samuelson, dismembered the latter's body, packed them in two trunks and sent them to Los Angeles.

For a time Herman Lewkowitz and Paul Schepek, defense attorneys, considered asking a change of venue. This idea was abandoned weeks ago—there was not enough interest here to justify it.

Instead, they will plead that their client was insane when she killed—that she must have been insane to kill her two best friends and cut up the body of one.

Some time on the night of October 15 or early on the morning of the 16th the two women were shot to death in a duplex apartment Mrs. Judd formerly shared with them.

County Attorney Lloyd J. Andrews contends they were killed while asleep. The slayer declares she shot in self defense during a quarrel in which both she and the girls threatened to tell "certain things" to a mutual man friend.

A day and a half later the bodies were sent in the trunks to Los Angeles. Mrs. Judd, accompanied by her brother, a Los Angeles student, appeared at the railroad station and claimed the baggage. They were asked to permit inspection of the trunks, which had aroused suspicion.

"My husband has the keys," Mrs. Judd replied. She and her brother left. Their failure to return caused officials to open the trunks.

Police were called and a search was started for the women. Four days later after an extensive hunt an attorney led the officers to an undertaking establishment within a stone's throw of the Los Angeles hall of justice.

Mrs. Judd had taken refuge there after coming to Los Angeles from a suburban hiding place, while her attorney made arrangements for her surrender.

She readily admitted the shooting and said she had planned to dump the trunks in the ocean. Her brother, not knowing the contents, he said, had agreed to assist her.

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second time she went down two doubled.

The first effort was a great gamble for a big score. It was in rubber 38. The Culbertsons had a game, the enemy had none. In addition Lenz had just gone down 1000 points. Had the slam succeeded the Culbertsons would have tabulated more than 1450 points right there. As it was, they won the rubber by point total, although Lenz and Jacoby received the bonus. The second slam try was a deliberate sacrifice.

Mrs. Culbertson was much of the business end of the partnership in the session's scoring. She played every hand of a four-hand rubber herself, No. 38. With 100 honors she was set one at five clubs, then made six on trump on a bid of three, six more on a bid of two and then five spades on a bid of four.

In the belief that the representatives of the "official" system were using his approach methods of bidding, especially by bidding one of a suit on a balanced hand instead of no trump as preferred in the "official" system, Culbertson called a conference of players and referees before the session started. He described the discussion as friendly without argument or protest. He cited letters to him from friends who had thought from published hands that Lenz and Jacoby were not adhering to their system's methods as stipulated in the agreement before the match.

only with great difficulty. They were aided by firemen, policemen and citizens of Falconwood drawn to the fire by the sight of the mounting flames.

Executives Aid Firemen
The mayor of Falconwood and the city councilors adjourned a session of council to join the firefighters. Premier Stewart also joined the rescuers, and city physicians and clergymen were other volunteer firemen and first aid workers.

The patients, dazed, wandered uncertainly about in the light of the fire, but there was no disorder. Many patients, after the shock of their narrow escape had passed, assisted in the work of relief to those of their number who had been injured or who faced suffering from the cold. Bedding, clothing and hospital supplies were provided promptly by requisition from other hospitals, the jail, the armory and stores. The patients were taken to the infirmary and adjoining buildings. Even stables were used, so urgent was the need of getting the patients out of the cold.

Only a few were injured, and the objective of doctors mainly was to forestall illness from exposure.

The west wing of the hospital was built in 1878, the east wing in 1899.
