- CHICKEN AND RICE
- Stewed Prunes
- Cooked Corn Cereal and Milk

- Chicken and Rice, Escalloped
- Mashed Turnips

- Chicken Soup for Six
- (Uses Leftovers)
- Chicken bones
- 1-3 cup diced chicken
- Chicken skin, cut fine
- 6 cups water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Mix ingredients. Cover and cook slowly 1 1/2 hours. Strain thoroughly and add vegetables.
- 1/2 cup cooked peas
- 1/2 cup diced potatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 2 tablespoons chopped onions
- 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers
- 1 cup water
- Mix ingredients and add to strained chicken mixture. Cook slowly 30 minutes. Serve hot in bowls.

- 3 tablespoons butter or chicken fat
- 4 tablespoons flour

Ostrich a Fast Mover

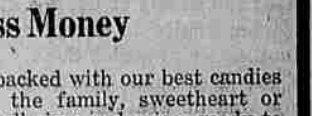
The ostrich at top speed runs faster than 70 miles an hour, according to tests made in the Syrian desert.
