

## American Saints To Be Announced By Papal Decree

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Eight United States saints, three of them women, probably will be proclaimed from the cases under consideration by the congregation of rites.

Nine more from Canada and two from Mexico are before the congregation, a total of 19 for North America.

Of the Americans all eight were members of religious orders. Four were founders of orders. One was a bishop.

Seven Cities in List  
St. Louis is advancing the cause of two. The other ecclesiastical proceedings originated in Chicago, New Orleans, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Indianapolis and Baltimore.

Monsignor John N. Neumann, Redemptorist, once bishop of Philadelphia, where he died in 1860, is nearest of all to beatification, the degree which precedes canonization.

His cause was begun in 1896. The congregation of rites has approved the proof of his virtues and is examining the evidence of miracles wrought through his intercession.

The other candidates for sainthood are:

Anna Elizabeth Seton, founder of the Sisters of Charity, died in 1821. Baltimore originated the petition for beatification.

Missionaries Named  
Felix De Andreis, Lazarist missionary, died in 1820. St. Louis.

Frances Cabrini, founder of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart, who died in 1917 in Chicago.

Francis Xavier Seelos, Redemptorist, born in Baltimore, died in New Orleans, 1867.

Magno Catala, Franciscan, died in San Francisco, 1830.

Venerable Philippine Duchesne, founder of the Sacred Heart Sisters in the United States, died in 1852. St. Louis originated the petition.

Theodore Guerin, founder of the Sisters of Providence, died in Indianapolis, 1859.

Many Italian Causes  
North America has only a small number of prospective saints, compared with the rest of the world. The congregation of rites is examining petitions for beatification or canonization of 551 men and women. Practically half—271—originated in Italy. France is next with 116. South America is advancing 21 causes.

## Cotton Industry In Britain Looks On Bright Side

MANCHESTER, England (AP)—The deluge of Chinese orders which washed the cobwebs off Britain's cotton industry in the last two months, is slackening and Lancashire again is talking curtailment of production by immobilizing 10,000,000 spindles.

But despite this condition and the threat of a renewal of civil disobedience in India, the trade generally is optimistic. The curtailment program is aimed at permanent revivification and there are signs of a real betterment in the chief markets.

India Buys Again  
For one thing, the slower China business seems due chiefly to a weakening in silver's buying power, coupled with the filling of immediate needs.

India has been coming back as a buyer, not with anything like its pre-Gandhi vigor, but sufficiently to indicate that the relationship of the pound and rupee in their present low circumstances is telling against the gold backed yen of Japan.

Furthermore, the Dutch East Indies, which rank about third as enormous consumers of cotton goods, have ventured a tentative foot into the Lancashire pond.

This appears to be due to two reasons. The fall of the pound permits the English mills to meet the Japanese prices. Also a big part of the cotton goods in the Indies is handled by Chinese traders and

Chinese the world over have been boycotting Japanese goods.

Deliveries of raw cotton to spinners, the surest index of the state of the industry, are well up over last year.

From the first of August, to the middle of November, 337,676 bales of American cotton went to the spinners, as against 283,000 last year. Argentine cotton, 32,500 bales, last year 23,000; Brazil, 58,000, last year 32,521; Peru 60,904, last year 50,000.

TRAINS AID GERMAN STAGE

BERLIN (AP)—The German Federal railways offers a two-thirds fare to persons wishing to hear symphonies or operas or to attend legitimate theatres in the next largest city. The privilege does not apply to vaudeville and movie patrons.

BOOM! BINGO! A DAM!

LYONS, France (AP)—Two rocky hills were blasted into the Aisne river at a narrow point near here, forming a dam which made a lake 18 miles long, the project being designed to produce 75,000,000 kilowatt hours a year by water power.

JERUSALEM GROWTH RAPID

JERUSALEM (AP)—Jerusalem has increased in population by almost

50 per cent since 1922, having 90,526 inhabitants as compared with 62,678 in the last census.

Other cities of the Holy land are about stationary. Hebron, for example, had 16,557 in 1922 and 17,000 this year.

COPPER HIGHER

NEW YORK, Dec. 18 (AP)—Sales of copper were made today at 7 1/2 cents, representing a recovery of 1 cent a pound from the recent low price. A fair volume of buying was reported in the trade. Today's advance naturally followed the upward revision in the export price by Copper Exporters, Inc., which early in the day named a price equivalent to 7 1/2 cents, as compared with 7 cents previously.

## Easier Feeling Is Reflected In Butter Market

PORTLAND, Dec. 18 (AP)—Easier feeling continues to be reflected generally in the market for butter. This applies to the country generally, as well as to the Pacific slope. Under-

tone of the coast trade is even weaker than outside quotations reflect. Shading of prices is now more or less general, but former top values continue to be nominally listed.

The fact that there is a differential of but 1c lb. in the price of butter from top to bottom score, indicates that the public is today buying price and cares little regarding quality. This is giving promoters of better grade butter a difficult problem to solve.

Butterfat prices are weaker with most interests inclined to quote the lower figures.

Market for eggs continues to gather weakness here but no changes in the price were announced during the day by the Pacific co-ops. Secret shading of values is reported by some private firms and outsiders.

With a cut of 1c in the price of lightweight stuff, the market for live chickens indicates general depression. Heavy hens are showing no change. Roasters are very weak.

While there appears quite a fair supply of geese, which are nominally quoted at 10c to 12c for live stuff and 18c for dressed, there is a shortage of ducks at the moment at 15c to 16c for live pexins and 22c for dressed birds.

First carload of tomatoes out of Mexico for Portland is due to arrive Monday. As there is a duty of 3c lb. on every box that arrives from over the line, the price will not be low. In the meantime Californian are higher and not very good while local hothouse are scarce and firm.

With outside markets not inclined to pay the price demanded, the best offers for carload lots of onions at Willamette Valley sources are now are now down to \$2.75, sacks and twine, a loss of 25c. Growers are not offering.

There was no change in the price of country killed meats Friday along the wholesale way although veal arrivals are inclined to prove liberal. Hogs and lambs are held unchanged.

Notes of wholesale trading:  
Some jumbo size local cranberries are being offered at \$4.50 bushel box. Ordinary stock firm up to \$4.

Small supplies of hothouse mushrooms are still being offered at 60c lb. Steelhead salmon is scarcer and firmly priced at 15c.

There is little sale of storage haid-bus and prices are being shaded generally. Citrus fruit prices are being shaded, especially in oranges due to the truck shipments.

Los Angeles lettuce is being quoted at \$5, a high mark here.

Potatoes continue nominal at the source; dull here.

WOOL MARKET  
BOSTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Fair quantities of strictly combing 48-50's domestic wool sold at steady prices today. Pieces of this description brought 36 to 38 cents secured basis, while territory offerings sold at 40 to 43 cents. Top makers reported better deliveries on old contracts and some new contracts on 50's top have been booked.
