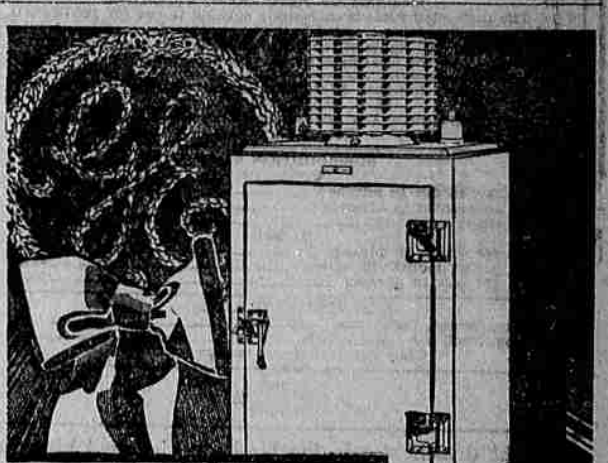

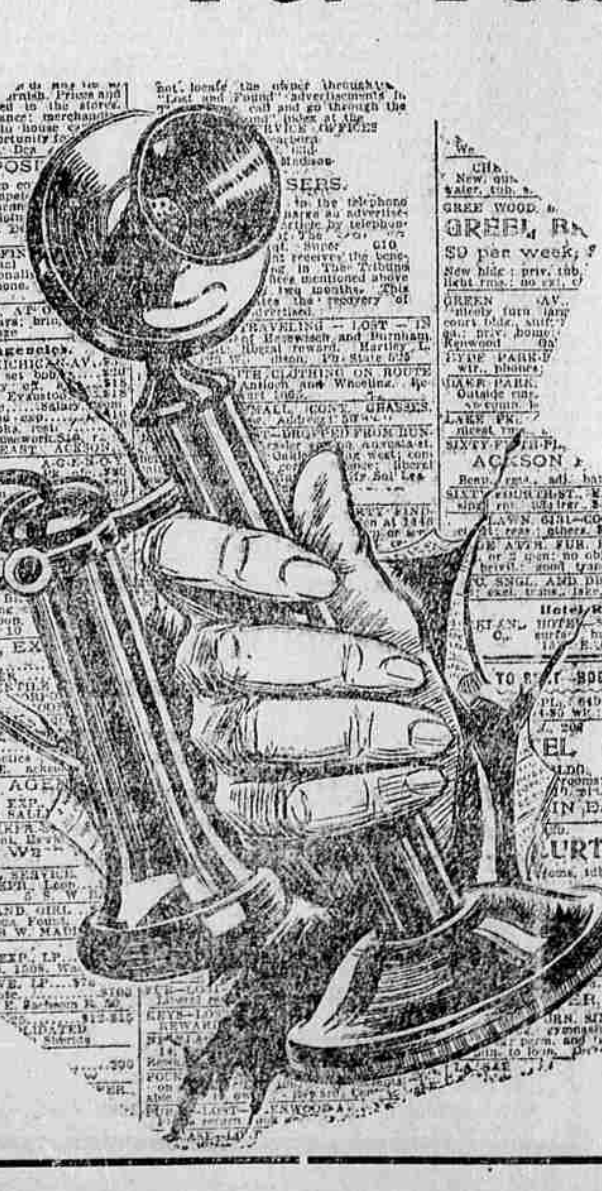
were served to the guests, and a feature of the evening was the Christmas tree from which each received a gift.
