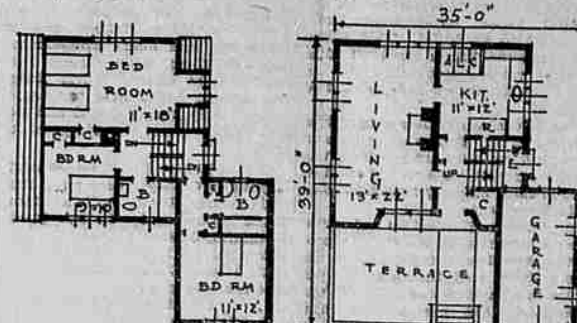
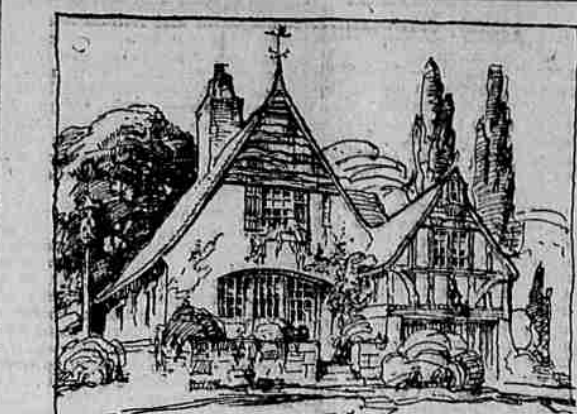
Episcopal Church Children In Party

76 MILLIONS IS NOVEMBER TOTAL

Building Permit Figures For 579 Cities in United States Received.
Building permits in 579 cities and towns of the United States during the month of November amounted to \$76,004,339 according to official reports made to S. W. Straus & Co. This figure represents a 15.3 per cent decline from October of this year, when the volume for those cities was \$87,891,821, as compared with a normal seasonal decline of 8.5 per cent. Permits issued during November, 1931, fell 42.2 per cent below the same month of 1930.
