Menus Of The Day

- By Mrs. Alexander George A DINNER MENU Pork Chops Victoria Escalloped Cabbage Bread Peach Jam Grapefruit Salad Apple Pudding Cream Coffee Pork Chops Victoria (Serving 6) 6 loin chops 1 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon paprika 4 tablespoons flour 2 cups boiled rice 1/2 cup chopped celery 1/2 cup chopped onions 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers 2 cups tomatoes Have chops cut 2-3 inch thick. Sprinkle with salt and paprika. Roll in flour. Fit into baking pan. Cover with rest of ingredients. Cover with lid and bake 1 1/2 hours in moderate oven. Remove lid and bake 10 minutes in hot oven to brown top. Apple Pudding 2 cups flour 4 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 4 tablespoons fat 2-3 cup milk Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in fat with knife. Mixing with knife add milk. When soft dough form pat it out on floured paper until 2-3 inch thick. Place in a greased pan. Spread with apple mixture. Apple Mixture 3 cups sliced apples 1/2 cup water 2-3 cup sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon cloves 3 tablespoons butter Mix apples and water. Cover and cook 5 minutes. Add rest of ingredients. Mix well and pour over dough. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Serve warm. Use orange juice in your French dressing recipe for variety. Use 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 2 tablespoons of orange juice when the recipe calls for 4 tablespoons of lemon juice or vinegar.

JOHNSON CONTINUES FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—The senate was told today by Senator Johnson, Republican, of California, that the constitution was "utilized as a mere scrap of paper and torn to bits" by President Hoover in negotiating the one year moratorium.

JOHNSON'S CONTENTIONS

Johnson contended President Hoover, whom he did not mention by name, negotiated in effect a treaty on the moratorium with France and the allies without calling congress into session.

HOOPER SIGNS RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—President Hoover late Monday signed the joint resolution to provide \$200,000,000 to provide for continued payments on veterans' bonus certificates.

CONGRESS ASSURES HOOPER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—President Hoover expects congress to get to work on the reconstruction corporation early next month, and said today he has congressional assurance it will be passed.
