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The Lord will give grace and glory; no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly.—Psalm 84: 11.

DISARMING THE WORLD

When Senator Borah recently broadcast to Europe the flat assertion that failure to disarm is a direct slap in the face for the Versailles treaty, he touched upon a point which the nations have been ignoring entirely.

Under that treaty, if you remember it, Germany was almost completely disarmed. Stripped of her submarines and her air force, and forbidden to replace these losses, limited to a third-rate navy and an army of only 100,000 men, Germany ceased to be a "great power" in the strict military sense of the term.

That, of course, was simply a part of the program laid down by the victors. But the treaty added that all of this was to be a preliminary to the general disarmament of all the powers. It was understood that Germany must disarm first, and that her conquerors would follow suit in the immediate future.

But today, as Senator Borah points out, the nations are more strongly armed than ever, and nearly five billion dollars a year is being spent in order to still further strengthen and increase them. The disarmament clause of the Versailles treaty has been deliberately ignored.

Yet Senator Borah's speech was no more indicative of European sentiment than was the way in which it was received. There were two meetings in Paris that night; one to hear speeches in favor of disarmament, and the other to protest against the first meeting. The latter proceeded in an orderly manner, but the disarmament meeting dissolved in catcalls and sporadic fistuffs.

Alanson B. Houghton was unable to make his speech at all. Former Premier Herriot voiced a rather obvious truth in stating that "the spirit must prevail over the brute forces of the world" and was greeted with a cry of "Nonsense!" from young men in front of him—all of which indicates the sadly low plane upon which some foes of armament reduction base their arguments.

So it appears that the advocates of world peace have a real job on their hands. Logic and common sense are on their side, but they face an angry passion which always flares up at the critical moment and completely destroys the results of years of constructive effort. But much permanent progress has been made, and the cause is gaining wider and wider favor everywhere.

WOMEN IN CONGRESS

Nine years ago Rebecca Latimer Felton occupied one of Georgia's seats in the United States senate for twenty-four hours. None other of her sex has ever enjoyed that distinction until this month, when the new congress convened with Mrs. Hattie Caraway in the chair of her late husband, Thaddeus Horatius Caraway, of Arkansas.

Mrs. Caraway's presence there is not just a stunt. Although she is there by reason of her husband's death, she may continue there for a full term by the will of the voters of her state, for she is the Democratic candidate for reelection, and is conceded an excellent chance to win.

This small but significant gain for the feminists in the upper branch of congress is more than counteracted, however, by losses in the house, where there are now but six women members as compared with the twelve of the previous session. Ruth Hanna McCormick gave up her seat last year to campaign for the senatorial honors in Illinois, but was unsuccessful. Mrs. Pearl Oldfield, of Arkansas, has retired. Mrs. Katherine Langley, of Kentucky, was defeated. Of the six survivors three are Republicans and three are Democrats.

But, though the women politicians are fewer in number this year, they will exert more influence than ever before through their attainment of several important committee places. They have become established in the committee rooms and thus will be able to have a hand in the framing of legislation. Our laws may yet take on that long predicted feminine touch.

Senator Fess, Senior Senator from Ohio, Rose From Poverty, reads story number one, "Record of Senator Fess Activities as Solon Unexcelled" reads story number two in even larger and blacker letters.

Then for eight full pages, in a score or more stories, the story of Fess is told.

There is an account of the pleasure he gets in the reading of good books on page two. "Through his hard, full, eventful life," one may learn, "he has read ravishingly of the best in the world's literature."

There is a sketch drawn after he had completed the keynote address at the Republican national convention in Kansas City. It is an informal pose and bears the caption "Senator Fess is talked of for the vice presidential nomination, but says he would rather be in the senate."

Apparently little that the senator has ever said or done is omitted from this issue of the "Sen. Simon D. Fess." It's about all there.

A picture of his beautiful home in Yellow Springs is carried, about with one of the cabin in which he was born. It's not the same log cabin, but one just like it. The original no longer stands.

A few of the captions afford a good idea as to the type of material: "Wasn't much at barn dance, but about at spelling bee, said says."

"Answers every letter in his heavy crutch," says the story. "Rides horseback with president."

"Occupants of White House often ask advice of Fess." "Fess pays handsome tribute to womanhood in suffrage address." Fess reveals sympathy for farmers.

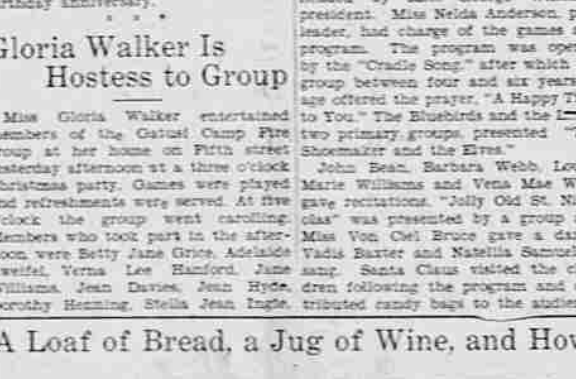
