Tusko Engages In Wild Break For His Liberty

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—His wild Christmas day struggle for freedom frustrated, Tusko, the mad elephant, stands fettered by great chains in his badly damaged barn here.

The 10-ton brute early yesterday snapped the chains that held his front legs and it was more than 12 hours later before he was brought under control.

When Tusko tossed off his front leg shackles, his movements were restricted only by long stout chains, anchored in blocks of concrete buried underground, fastened about his hind legs. He began an assault on his quarters, smashed down one wall of the barn and pushed through. Only the two chains prevented his escape into the city streets.

Police were called and three of the city's best marksmen, armed with high power rifles, were sent to investigate. They stood guard until daybreak, when the job of returning the bellowing bull to his quarters was begun.

During the day the animal's ill temper grew and he made repeated lunges at his keepers and spectators that gathered to watch him. The situation became so acute that Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins sent a dozen officers, armed with submachine guns and rifles, to prepare to kill the elephant. Spectators were ordered far back out of danger and several nearby streets were closed to traffic.

City officials, called to consider the matter, decided the beast should be killed at once but Mayor George L. Baker by long distance telephone ordered such a step should be taken only as a last resort.

Tusko finally was tricked into stepping inside a steel cable hose. The other end of the cable had been attached to a powerful truck and as the truck moved forward, Tusko's one front foot was caught fast. His trainers, keeping the powerful truck away with a sharp steel prod, succeeded in placing cables and chains about both legs and clamping them tight.

The cables then were attached to a powerful winch and Tusko was dragged back into his barn. Several hours later Jack O'Grady and "Sleepy" Gray, his keepers, said they were positive they had him fastened so securely there was no chance for him to break loose again.

The city council was expected to debate Tusko's ultimate fate today.

PRINEVILLE, Ore., Dec. 26 (AP)—Rudolph Retzlaff, operator of a truck line between Prineville and Paulina, was killed Thursday night in an automobile crash about 45 miles from here. His body was found Christmas day. Retzlaff had been thrown clear of his car after it had plunged 60 feet from the icy road to the bottom of crooked River canyon.

THREE KILLED

SAN JOSE, Cal., Dec. 26 (AP)—A man and two girls were killed and other persons injured here Christmas day when an automobile skidded on slippery pavement and crashed into another.

Marvin F. Keenan, 30, instructor in geology at Stanford university; Miss Ada Annabell, 22, his fiancée, and Miss Josephine Clay, 24, were on their way to a holiday reunion. The three were killed. Both girls were from Tacoma.

'32 OUTLOOK REASSURING, MOSES SAYS

He was considering "methods of expediting action by congress on the economic program he outlined recently."

The program referred to was one of 12 points. On December 11 the president drew together in one statement all of the steps recommended to congress and others put into effect through executive action.

Foremost was the \$500,000,000 emergency reconstruction corporation now awaiting congressional action and the \$100,000,000 increase of capitalization for the federal land banks already passed by the house.

Other points such as the release of deposits in closed banks, creation of a home loan discount bank system and enlargement of federal reserve bank discount facilities have yet to be taken up by committee.

SUB-COMMITTEE REPORTS
WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (AP)—The house bill to increase the capitalization of federal land banks by \$100,000,000 would be increased to \$125,000,000 under a senate banking sub-committee decision reported today.

The added amount would be especially earmarked for granting postponements on mortgage installments due from farmers.

Chairman Carey, Republican, Wyoming, said the sub-committee would report the measure favorably with this amendment.

will be made after a final executive session on Monday at which the language of the revised bill will be formally approved.

Senate Passage Certain
Senate passage of the measure is certain. It is designed to strengthen the land bank, thus facilitating credit for farmers.

As passed by the house, the measure would authorize the banks to extend mortgage payments over a five year period. The senate redraft differs in that it provides \$25,000,000 for this purpose.
