"something like a thousand million years ago were the highest mammals in existence."

"This Baltic fossil bridges the gap between man's evolutionary 'family,' as evolutionists say, the back-boned animals, and about three fourths of all the world's living creatures, which were considered beyond the pale of kinship. This vast outside host includes the insects. It is the arachnid family, the jointed-foot animals, creatures which carry their skeletons outside like armor plate instead of inside built around a backbone.

Now, he thinks, he has found the missing link to convince them. "For more than forty years," he said, "the author has been trying to find in one part of the world or another in primitive animals living or extinct some easily understood structure which would carry conviction to his less hopeful colleagues.

"That has been done, I think in the recent discovery of some ostracoderms from the island of Oesel in the Baltic seas. They show very clearly some of the earliest known geologic stages in the development of the face, with jaws and mouth as predicted and at the same time resembling a condition long known to exist in early embryonic stages of human beings.

"These very ancient fossils show us that the fundamental pattern of bodily organization from sea scorpions to man has not changed in any essential respect for something like a thousand million years, and that such evolutionary factors as heredity, environment and natural selection serve merely to sustain, liberate or control the inherent creative potentialities of the initial patterns."

The ostracoderm had six pairs of gills, or arches in the mouth. Prenatal humans also have gills and other similarities to animals. These animal "vestiges" change rapidly in the developing human into various normal organs.

It appears, Professor Patten explained, that the two upper pairs of ostracoderm gills develop into some of the upperhead bones. The third, fourth and fifth pairs became the upper and the lower jaws. The sixth pair turned into a chin.

"These developmental readjustments," he said, "laid the foundation for the human face."

non-high school districts for the purpose of raising the county high school tuition fund is thus arrived at by the amount of property valuation of all districts not maintaining high schools and the total costs of educating their students by the high schools of the county.

It has been the procedure in this county, and in a majority if not all the counties of the state, to make this levy in December to raise the money necessary to pay the bills submitted the preceding June. It is obvious the high schools would not then be paid for a year or a year and a half, and then only in the ratio that tax payments were made.

It has been the contention of the Imbler school board that the county started off one year behind 15 or 16 years ago when legislation was enacted by which these matters were governed. They contended that the levy in December should be based on an estimate for the ensuing year and theoretically would raise the money in June to pay the high schools at the close of their school year.

Money due the Imbler district for the years 1929-1930 and 1930-1931 totaled more than \$8000 and they demanded it with six per cent interest from the time it was alleged to be due, and that in the event there was no money in the county high school tuition fund, asked that the mandamus writ direct the county school superintendent to issue warrants on this fund drawing six per cent interest until paid.

This was granted them by Judge J. W. Knowles in his decision. Warrants are now being written to the other high schools of the county for their past due tuition, the total amounting to more than \$38,000.
