LIGGETT JOINS LENZ; GAIN MADE

contract for four spades. Lenz made five.

The advantage obtained by the doubles was diminished when Mrs. Culbertson succeeded at a little slam vulnerable, giving her a 700 rubber. Liggett could have prevented the slam's success by correct choice of an opening lead. He could have set Mrs. Culbertson once when he doubled her at two diamonds, but failed.

With the departure of Jacoby and his psychic bids and sets to prevent the other side going game, Lenz was in good humor, which he retained even when pointing out errors to Liggett, long a favorite partner of his at auction and now a member of the advisory council of Bridge Headquarters, Inc., sponsors of the "official" system of contract. Lenz and Liggett were set only three times for minor losses.

Culbertson blamed the decrease of his plus on freak distribution. For instance, when Liggett took thirteen tricks on a contract for five clubs doubled, Lenz had no spades and Lig-

Culbertson remained confident about the outcome of the 180-rubber match. Pointing out that the rate of gain for Lenz's side in the last two sessions would leave it far behind at the end of the match.

Presumably Liggett will continue as Lenz' partner to the end, since Jacoby announced he would not return. Mrs. Culbertson has at least ten more rubbers to play, and Culbertson has various other partners in view. One whom he had in mind, Mrs. John A. Warner, daughter of Alfred E. Smith, has found she will be unable to play.

DILL BOOSTS ROOSEVELT
WASHINGTON, Dec. 30 (AP)—Senator Dill of Washington asserted today that "the best way for the Democratic party to meet the threat and even the creation of a third party in 1932 will be to nominate Franklin D. Roosevelt for president."

In a statement, the Washington senator said: "No other Democrat appeals to the disappointed millions of independent voters in the United States as does Governor Roosevelt."

Labor In Favor Of Aid Appropriations

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30 (AP)—The American Federation of Labor today threw its influence behind the drive for direct federal appropriations for unemployment relief.

Edward F. McGrady, legislative representative of the federation, told a senate committee a national emergency exists which can be met only by the federal government. He estimated 7,500,000 will be out of work next year.

It was the first time the federation has taken a stand on the issue, to which President Hoover is opposed.

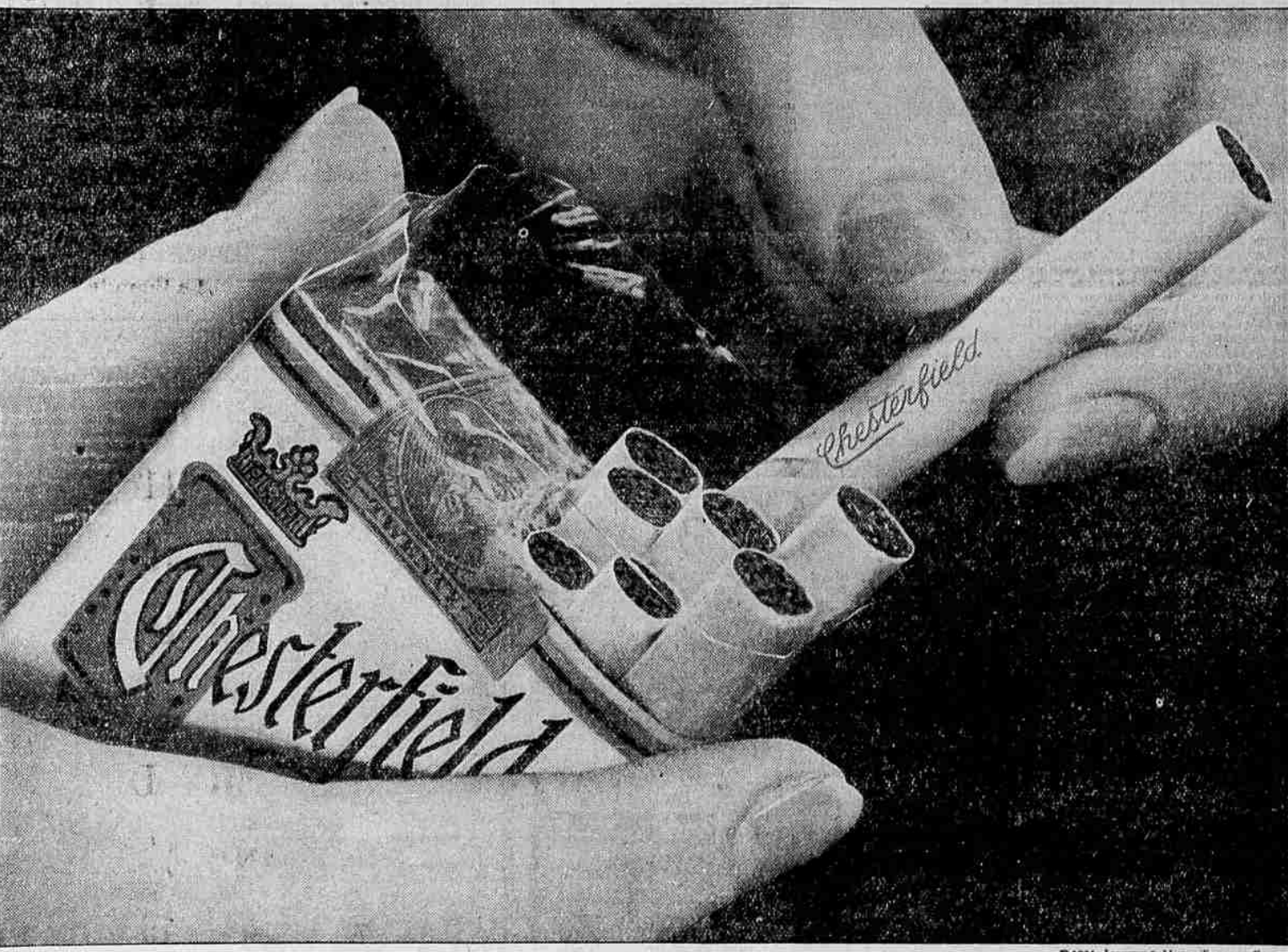
