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Borah Willing To Cut Wages 20 Pct.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Q. Gilmore returned to The Dalles to spend Christmas.

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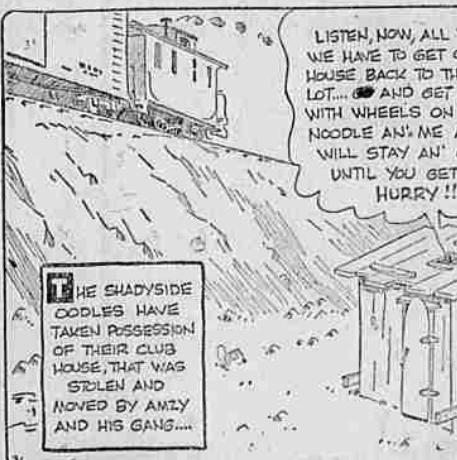
