REMOVING TONSILS

After 10 years of experimentation and study of the removal of tonsils by various electrical means, it appears to be the opinion of competent observers that "electrosurgical removal of tonsils cannot yet be considered as the most desirable method for routine removal of the tonsils."

This judgment is editorially expressed in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

The process has certain advantages over straight surgical tonsil removal. But there are also certain disadvantages.

When there are certain complications existing, electrosurgical removal of the tonsils may be the preferred method of operation.

Young patients with heart disease, tuberculosis, or kidney disease, are better served by this method than by straight surgery.

The advantages reside in the process being practically painless and shock free.

Anesthesia is not required, hemorrhage is prevented, the tonsils are cauterized, they may be removed, or, better, coagulated and destroyed slowly in any number of desired treatments.

There are of course the disadvantages of time consumed in the treatments, and the proportionate expense.

There is some danger of the treatment leading to sloughing of tissue and to swelling and edema. Abscesses may also form.

The editorial wisely warns that "many considerations must enter into the decision of the individual physician in the individual case as to whether or not electrosurgical removal of the tonsils is the method of choice."

"In the vast majority of cases, electrosurgical removal of the tonsils has not yet been proved to be the method of choice."

"This should not interfere, however, with its application in properly selected instances."

NERVOUS INDIGESTION

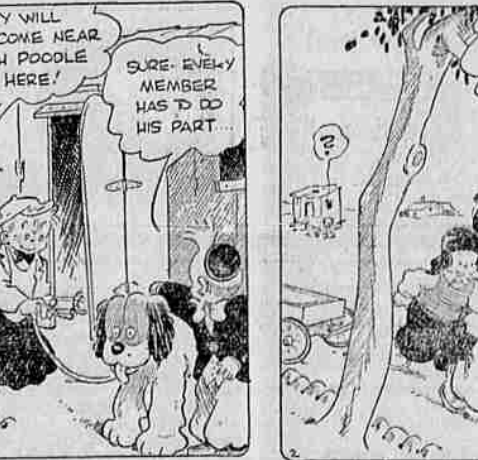
