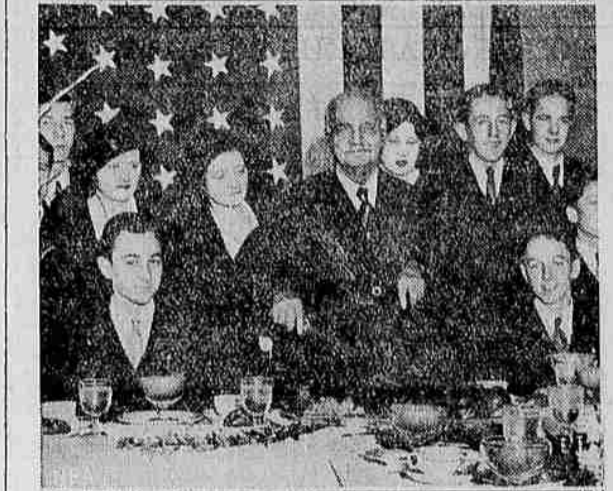
With a black frock and coat she wears a close fitting toque of turquoise Kingfisher feathers ornamented with a brush of upstanding feathers in the back.

Late Winter Is Bringing Paris The 50-50 Frock

By Diana Merwin (Associated Press Fashion Editor) PARIS (AP) — A new "Fifty-Fifty Frock" is the smart Parisian's latest addition to a wintery wardrobe. The new half-and-half dresses—a reminder of winter in fabrics and a prophet of spring in cut and color—are designed to brighten wardrobes beginning to sag under the strain of two months' hard wear.

A new pinky-beige, silver grey, coral red and bright blue are among the outstanding colors, while black frocks (still a favorite with smart Parisians) are relieved with touches of shell pink or ivory instead of dead white.

Wools are a favorite fabric for the new fifty-fifty frocks. One of them of coral red in lightweight gunnysack weave has a braided belt of coral and brown, while another of grey wool is trimmed with a braided scarf of purple, mauve and grey satin.

For the woman in black there is a black maroon frock with a shoulder jabot and lower puffed sleeves of pale pink chiffon embroidered in pink and black, while The Girl Who Wears Brown may choose a brown crepe with a crushed belt and crinkled cuffs of apple green crepe.

- GINGERBREAD A FAVORITE
- Menu For Dinner
- Baked Ham and Potatoes
- Escalloped Carrots
- Bread
- Fruit Salad
- Gingerbread
- Baked Ham and Potatoes
- Escalloped Carrots (Serving 6)
- 1 1/2 pounds sliced ham.
- 3 cups sliced potatoes.
- 3 tablespoons flour.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika.
- 1/4 teaspoon celery salt.
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped onions.
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.
- 1 1/2 cup milk.
- Have ham cut 2-3 inch thick. Fit it into shallow baking pan. Mix potatoes, flour and seasonings. Place on top ham. Add milk and cover with lid. Bake 1 hour in moderate oven. Baste several times. If preferred the ham can be baked in a casserole.
- Escalloped Carrots
- 3 tablespoons butter.
- 4 tablespoons flour.
- 2 1/2 cups milk.
- 4 tablespoons cheese, cut fine.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper.
- 2 cups diced, cooked carrots.
- Melt butter and add flour. Blend and add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add cheese, salt and pepper. Mix well and add carrots. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

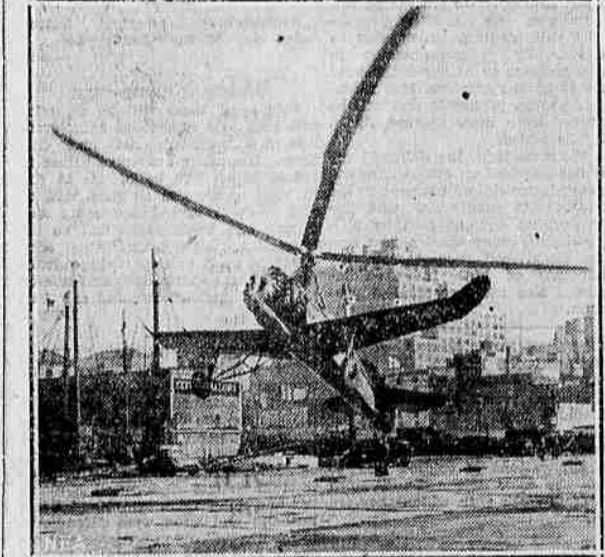
