

Wallowa Sheep Men Prepare For Lambing Season

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special)—Some of the sheep flock owners in this end of the valley are making preparations for starting lambing during the latter part of this month. A few young lambs have already arrived at the John Couch farm in Leap and are reported to be doing nicely despite the cold weather.

Roy Gastin has been repairing an engine at the John Couch farm in Leap.

Egg prices have suffered a drop of several cents here during the past two weeks. The price being paid at some of the local stores now is ranging from 32 to 34 cents per dozen. Reports from several of the poultry keepers state that production is at a low point, with many of the later hatched pullet flocks and hens which were held over just getting started laying.

The lowest price to be received for butterfat in this section for many years has been in effect during the past two or three weeks. On Saturday of last week 23 cents per pound was being paid. With present prices of hay and other feeds necessary for good production some of the producers who are buying a large part of their feed consider it extremely lucky if they are able to break even while butterfat prices remain around this figure.

Water is still scarce at a number of the farms in this section. The long, continuous freezing has greatly lessened the low supply at many of the farms in the hill sections. Some hauling is still being done at some of the farms in the Leap section. Others who are quite short have been doing considerable melting of snow for washing and for watering small livestock.

Several trappers in this section have been doing considerable melting of snow during the past few weeks in an effort to get possession of some of the fur coats of coyotes and other small fur-bearers which are reported to be quite plentiful in some parts of the community. Reports indicate that a few coyotes, an occasional badger and a limited number of weasel have been caught by some of those having out traps.

MOVE TO SAVE WATER MILLS AS STATE PARK SITES
