## Chats With Parents

FEAR OF SPOILING HIM

A mother complained that her six-year-old boy was loud, destructive and disobedient.

"This she thought was particularly strange, as she had always been afraid of spoiling him and had never indulged him in any way."

Investigation revealed the fact that she had not only refrained from spoiling him, but that she had, without realizing it, ignored and neglected him.

Busy with two younger babies, she had no time for talk and play with the older child. Her remarks to him were confined chiefly to telling him what not to do.

No wonder he was naughty, for only when he was disobedient did he get any attention.

"This little boy improved very soon after his mother realized what she had been doing and made a genuine effort to give him some of her time and to show him that she was interested in him and fond of him."

A mother who makes a great point of not spoiling her child may well ask herself whether her attitude springs from an unconscious effort to excuse a lack of affection and interest.

Remember that no child can be good unless he is happy, and that a large part of the happiness of childhood consists in the assurance that one is loved and that one may win approval.

So long as a child feels himself to be outside the warm circle of his parents' love, so long as he feels that he does not matter, he is driven to misbehavior.

Partly, this represents a desire to get even with those who have denied him. Partly, it is an effort to assert himself and to make his presence felt at any cost.

## Health

### PYLORIC STENOSIS

Pyloric stenosis affects infants during the first weeks of life. It is characterized by explosive vomiting, constipation, visible contractions of the stomach, and the presence of a lump in the upper mid-

portion of the infants' abdomen. With this there is also marked emaciation, or loss of weight.

The condition sometimes is called congenital pyloric stenosis or hypertrophy of the pylorus in infants, hypertrophy meaning an excessive growth or development.

The mechanism of the condition is easy to describe, though its cause still is disputed. Dr. Still of London speaks of it as a "stuttering" stomach.

He considers the condition due to a lack of co-ordination in the actions of the stomach musculature.

It is encountered often enough to warrant notice and study.

The pylorus is the funnel shaped end of the stomach leading to the small intestines.

In the normal digestive workings of the stomach the pylorus relaxes its terminal end every so often to allow food to pass into the small intestines.

In pyloric stenosis, this end of the stomach remains contracted, and allows the passage of but little or no food.

Together with this contraction, and possibly due to it, there is also a thickening of the musculature in this region, contributing to the narrowing of the passage.

Pyloric stenosis is more common among male infants.

The first symptoms, those of vomiting, most commonly appear from the first to the ninth week of life.

The condition may appear later, but is rare.

DETROIT, Jan. 13 (AP)—Heartened by a telegraphic message from President Hoover, the American Road Builders association has called upon Congress to "stop contemplated (road building) reductions that would throw an additional 500,000 men out of work."

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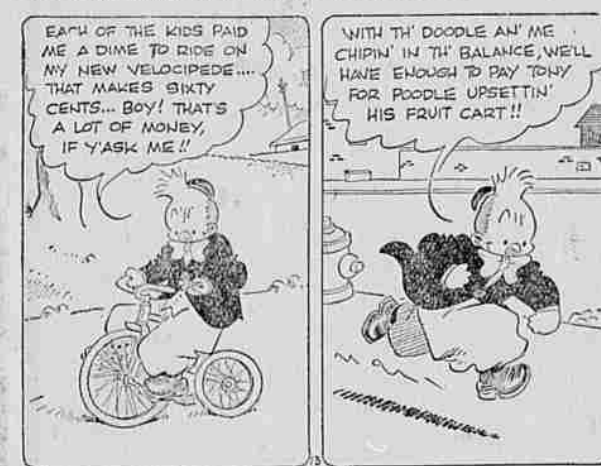

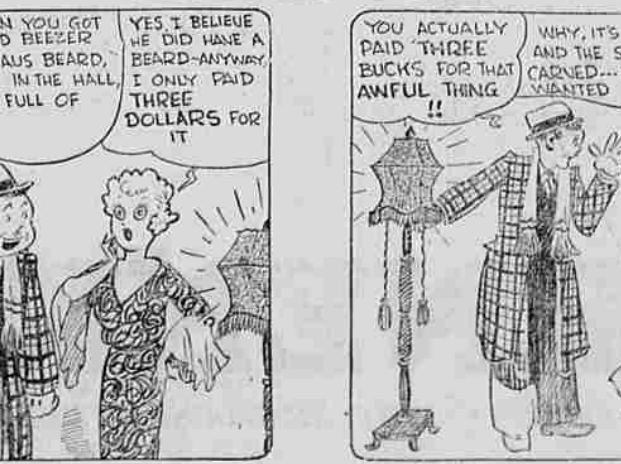
