### Health

#### SEASONAL RICKETS

Rickets is a seasonal disease affecting the entire constitution, but with its effects most evident in the bones.

Though prevalent throughout the year, it increases in the fall, becomes more marked in the winter and reaches its peak in March. The rachitic child—one with rickets—presents a picture easily recognized. The head is square and the chest deformed, showing two rows of round swellings where the ribs join the breast bones. The child's abdomen is excessively large and prominent, appearing like the proverbial "pot belly." The legs are bowed, or knock-kneed, and the wrists are swollen and soggy to the touch.

The above is, of course, a picture of the advanced case. There are many degrees of rickets in between the extremes.

Rickets is at present looked upon as a deficiency disease arising out of lack of vitamin D.

It has been shown time and time again that the disease can be prevented and cured by the administration of vitamin D and by exposing the child to sunlight or artificially produced ultra-violet rays.

The practical prevention of rickets therefore depends upon diet and sunshine.

Cod liver oil has for many years been known to help prevent rickets. In recent times viosterol has been employed in certain cases instead of cod liver oil.

The choice of one or another of the other must be made by the attending physician.

The average dose is three drops of pure refined oil three times daily beginning after the first month.

The dose should be increased so that by the time the infant is three months old it is receiving one and one-half teaspoonfuls daily.

Infants should also be kept out of doors as much as possible with the arms and legs exposed to the rays of the sun.

#### BAD WORDS

Some day your child will come home with words upon his lips which will shock and offend you.

You will wonder where he got such language and very likely, unless you think in time, you will fix in your child's mind the thought that using bad words is a fine way to create a stir.

The expressions that your child picks up are often a bit breath-taking, but don't let them catch you off your guard. Don't let him know you are shocked. Don't make a fuss about them. Don't let them worry you.

Remember that for him they probably carry no such extreme connotations of evil or vulgarity as they carry for you.

It is best if you can ignore them entirely, for then, even if he has used them with some faint notion that they would give you a jolt, he gets no satisfaction out of his attempt.

His bad words have fallen flat and are less likely to be used often for that very reason.

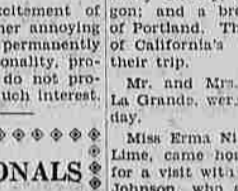
