ACTIVE YEAR IN POLITICS LIKELY HERE

McNary Is Under Consideration For High Court

PORTLAND, Jan. 16 (AP)—A Washington dispatch to the Journal here Friday said Senator McNary is believed to be under serious consideration for the appointment to the supreme court to succeed Justice Holmes, who resigned this week. "It is known," the dispatch said, "that some of his colleagues have urged Hoover to appoint him. They have pointed out that the Oregon senator meets the requirements said to be chiefly in the mind of the president, for the selection of a man from the west, a Republican, a liberal and one who may be confirmed without a battle in the senate." The communication says too, that "Senator Steiwer's name is among those suggested to the president. It has been advanced by former colleagues of his on the judiciary committee." President Hoover is expected to select the new justice within a few days.
