

LAVAL TO FILL BRIAND'S SHOES?

Friends Assert Premier Seeks Foreign Office

PARIS (AP)—Parisians who claim to be "in the know" are picking Pierre Laval as the eventual successor of Aristide Briand, France's apostle of peace, who has so long guided the policies of the French foreign office.

Whether the present head of the government will attain this place in the near future or forego it for the time being because of political considerations arising out of present circumstances is a moot subject.

Laval's friends say, however, that he nourishes the ambition to assume Briand's burdens, now that the latter has been obliged, by advancing years and decreasing health, to lay aside the heavy loads inherent with the portfolio in the Quai d'Orsay.

Washington Trip Helps

This responsibility has become greater as France of late has emerged as a "leading nation" and to French eyes at least, has appeared as having actually received a mandate to assume the van in putting Europe on its feet economically, politically and financially.

The position of French foreign minister, always important in the eyes of Europe, took on new significance and eminence as the result of Laval's journey to Washington. Coming on the heels of his jaunts to London and Berlin, the American visit brought him, like a meteor, to the forefront of French political life. As one French writer put it:

"Up to the time of the great adventure of the visit to the United States the French knew that M. Laval was a hard worker and capable, but it had not realized his force of character and his capacity of resistance."

Laval Is Tenacious

Laval is seen also as successor of Poincare in the domain of tenacious, bulldog adherence to a program—a program conceived to further the interests of France, and to insist upon international recognition of France's rights.

Behind all the economic, financial and political apprehensions of France there is one which stands out above all others, and that is the possibility of another invasion of French soil. Laval is held to have removed that fear from French hearts by his trip to Washington. Frenchmen believe he achieved there recognition of the fact that France is entitled to keep her army and navy at their present strength until an increase in the guaranty of security justifies reductions.

They look to the Geneva disarmament conference for further consolidation of this position.

Likes Foreign Problems

Premier Laval is greatly attracted by foreign problems, and in the program for European construction on which he has taken the initiative, the relations with foreign powers, including the United States, occupy naturally the first place.

That is why it is predicted that Laval will pass to the foreign office and from there direct his great project of French continental European leadership.

Sheriffs, District Attorneys, Gather In Annual Meeting

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22 (AP)—Abuses of the parole system and the need for reform in that direction was stressed here yesterday at a meeting of sheriffs and district attorneys of Oregon who annually gather to discuss problems of law enforcement.

It was the sense of the prosecutors that a parole is the proper thing when the defendant is not a confirmed criminal, but the attorneys emphasized that the courts and the parole board should be slow to grant paroles to old offenders.

The discussion of judicial reform and paroles was opened by E. D. Hicks, district attorney of Grant county.

Eighteen registered for the sheriffs' convention, and 20 for the district attorneys' meetings.

O. D. Bower, Marion county, who is vice president of the sheriffs' association, presided over that group, and Samuel E. Nelson, Morrow county, conducted the meetings of the district attorneys.

Resolutions of condolence noting the death of Sheriff T. M. Hurlburt of Multnomah county were adopted by the organization.

Sheriffs Mass of Clackamas, Bown of Lane and Hooker of Polk, McElwain of Lincoln and Dussault of Jefferson county were named as members of the legislative committee.

Sheriff Jackson of Douglas, Hooker of Polk, Low of Klamath, Fraser of Harney and Hess of Coos county were appointed to the nominating committee.

Asks Co-operation

W. K. Newell, federal prohibition commissioner, asked the sheriffs to co-operate with federal prohibition officers.

In leading the discussion before the district attorneys on judicial reform and paroles, Hicks declared that under the present parole system in Oregon Dan Kellaher is the only member of the parole board who makes investigations. He said the state should employ a board of physicians and psychiatrists to inquire into the mentality of prisoners before paroles are granted.

T. E. Gillenwater, district attorney of Klamath, said the association should accomplish things instead of

"passing resolutions and then forgetting about them."

Gillenwater cited the abuse of the grand jury system, which he said, "is the most antiquated and useless piece of legal machinery we have."

CARAMEL PUDDING, A FAVORITE

Breakfast
Apple Sauce
Corn Meal Mush and Milk
Coffee
(Milk for the Children)
Luncheon
Peanut Butter and Raisin Sandwiches
Hot Coffee Peach Sauce

Dinner
Escalloped Potatoes and Cheese
Bran Muffins
Head Lettuce French Dressing
Caramel Pudding Coffee
(Milk for the Children)

Peanut Butter Filling (For 8 Sandwiches)

1-3 cup peanut butter.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
3/4 cup milk.
3 tablespoons cream.
With fork mix ingredients and spread on graham bread. Arrange sandwich fashion.

Escalloped Potatoes, Serving 6
4 cups diced, boiled potatoes.
4 tablespoons fat.
1 cup milk.
1 cup water.
1/2 cup cheese, cut fine.
1 teaspoon salt.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.
Melt fat and add flour. When blended add milk and water. Cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Add cheese and seasonings. Add potatoes. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.

Caramel Pudding
1 cup dark brown sugar.
1-3 cup flour.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1 egg.
1/2 cups milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
Blend sugar, flour and salt. Add egg and milk. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir frequently. Add vanilla and cool and chill. Serve plain or with top milk.

Cooked oatmeal, cornmeal and wheat cereals should be served daily. They are a cheap source of energy.
