Attorney Cochran requested that the trial be moved to Enterprise, since he contended the feeling against Owen has not dissipated into that region to the extent which it has in Baker and Umatilla counties. On the condition that the trial of Owen be held first, District Attorney Carl Helm did not resist Mr. Cochran's motion for postponement of the trial, but Feb. 1 and Feb. 15. Cross-white's trial will follow that of Owen, since they have a right for separate trials under the statute. Judge Knowles stated. That his client, Owen, was willing to plead guilty to murder in the second degree was announced by Mr. Cochran, but the district attorney refused to consider such an announcement. previous murder trials, the crowds who gathered to witness the procedure have crowded close to the jury bench, even leaning against the railing so that their whispered opinions could be heard by the jury. District Attorney Helm asked that a rail be put a sufficient distance behind the jurors' box to keep the crowds back.
