which, by ordinary care, could have been prevented. The way to prevent crime, he said, is to educate the public.

As examples of offenses that could be prevented he cited automobile thefts, check violations, land frauds, stock swindles and other crimes of non-violence.

Ninety per cent of such crimes could be prevented if the prosecuting witnesses—the victims—would use ordinary care," he said. He said 90 per cent of the automobiles stolen belong to persons who leave the keys in the car "inviting men to become criminals."

James W. Crawford, Multnomah county circuit judge, told the attorneys "we are not deficient in prosecution" but that "we are deficient in the matter of parole, education and development of prisoners after they are sentenced and failure to segregate the juvenile and first offenders from hardened criminals."

Judge Crawford recommended legislation to permit the accused in a criminal case to waive jury trial, with the consent of the trial judge and the district attorney.
