

### It's Not Stalling Any More, Court Coaches Decide! It's Freeze Play!

This is the fourth of a series of articles written by Forrest C. "Phog" Allen, director of athletics at the University of Kansas and nationally known basketball coach.

LAWRENCE, Kan., Jan. 29 (AP)—Members of the vast army of basketball players in the United States and other countries, numbering some 18,000,000 men and boys, have a common purpose—namely, to throw a leather inflated sphere through a basket and to prevent opponents from doing likewise.

But this great multitude is far from united when it comes to the terminology of the game. There is a wide variation in the terms applied to plays, situations of the game and the apparatus used.

At last year's meeting of the National Association of Basketball Coaches in New York the coaches agreed upon a uniform basketball terminology for the United States. Next year these newly accepted terms will be made public in the rule book.

For instance, a play in which a player slips away from his guard and scores a basket unopposed is described as a set-up. Other names given this same play in various states are: criss, Sunday shots, guets, snow birds, lay ups, dogs, suckers, bunny, sleepers and pot shots.

**CORRECT TERMS**  
The word now accepted by the coaches as correct terminology, in the lists which follow, is quoted. The other are colloquialisms and barbarisms:

When the referee tosses the ball up at center on a "held ball," the play following is known as "tip-off," "tap-off," "tap," "jump ball," "tow," "center tap" or "center jump."

In case a winning team desires to withhold the ball from the opponents during play in the waning moments of the game it is called a "freeze," stall, bulldozing, roping, back court game or delayed offense.

Describing the defensive type of play so often spoken of as the man to man style, "shifting" was voted correct, with trading, switching, exchanging, sliding and man to man preferred in the order named.

The boards back of the baskets are to be known as "bank boards" or "back boards" or back stops, boards or banks.

"Basket" is given first rating with buckets, rims, irons, rings, hoops, nets and strings following in order. "Zone defense" rates first, ahead of mass, set, territorial, accordion and elastic band, pet terms used in many sections.

**NO LEGAL BLOCKS**  
Formerly we heard much of the legal block, which doesn't exist. However, "blocking," checking, picking off, smothering and spiking are used to denote fouls.

"Screening" is a new term used to designate a legal play wherein a player "passes" between an opponent with the intention of legally releasing his teammate for a shot at goal.

However, if screening shades into contact it is termed blocking and a foul results.  
In a situation where player "A" passes to his own teammate and player "A" receives the return pass, the play is called the "return pass," 1-2-1 pass, the shuttle or the triangle pass.  
The "back court" is the half of the court away from the player's basket. Back half is the other term applied to this area.

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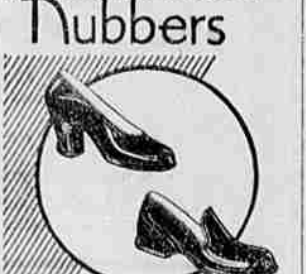
