Scott Funeral Held Sunday At Elgin, Fairview

ELGIN (Special) - The funeral of Joseph Scott was held Sunday at 12 o'clock at the Presbyterian church with Rev. B. Marcus Godwin, pastor of the La Grande Baptist church, in charge. He was assisted by Rev. L. B. Williams, of the Presbyterian church. A brief history of Mr. Scott was given, following the journey of the family from their eastern home to the little community, now known as Fairview, which the Scott family has settled. There remain "Grandma" Scott completely paralyzed for more than 25 years, seven children, Mrs. Quintus Witt, Mrs. Theodora Weiss, John and Overton, of Elgin, Albert, of Haines, David and Thomas, of Wallowa. There are also more than 70 grandchildren and great-grandchildren. During the last several weeks, "Uncle Joe" had been at the home of Mrs. Weiss and during the last three, the son, Tom, has also been assisting in his care. Following the service at the church, the funeral procession started on the long trip to Fairview. They were able to go as far as the Summit near Minam hill by car. There they transferred to a truck and made the remainder of the journey in an hour and a half. At the little church there, which had been Mr. Scott's very special pride, a great crowd of neighbors and friends had gathered and another brief service was held. Interment was made in the little cemetery near the church in the pines. The pallbearers were J. E. Witherspoon, D. I. Kennedy, Willis Culp, C. C. Cates, Bernal Hug, and Julius Hug.
