## POLITICS QUIET HERE, AT LEAST ON THE SURFACE

gathered at the banquet to give an early start to the Roosevelt-for-president boom in Oregon. At the Hazelwood restaurant last Thursday the Williams society gathered to hold its annual election of officers, and get organized for the year ahead—a year that holds promise of being red hot, politically speaking. And more names of prominent Democrats were being injected into discussion as possible candidates for public office.

"While Bert E. Haney is still maintaining a dignified silence on his position as a possible candidate for the Democratic nomination for the United States senate, an office for which ex-Governor Pierce has entertained longings but has not openly sought because of Mr. Haney's silence, the names of two more well-known Eastern Oregon Democrats have been advanced as possibilities for the senatorial nomination. These are E. B. Aldrich, editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian, and Cella L. Gavin of The Dalles, national committeewoman of her party. But, in spite of the rumors, nothing more has happened of a public nature as far as Mr. Pierce is concerned.

**Aldrich Not to Run**  
However, E. B. Aldrich, editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian, lost no time in informing the state Monday that he is not a candidate for any congressional office and has no intention of entering the race. He made the statement in connection with stories published in Portland Sunday papers that such a candidacy had been rumored.

**BILLINGSLEY FILED**  
SALEM, Feb. 4 (AP)—J. D. Billingsley, of Ontario, state senator from Malheur, Harney and Grant counties, filed his candidacy for re-election yesterday on the Republican ticket. Billingsley said he would "stand on my record."

## METSCHAN'S SISTER DIES

SALEM, Feb. 4 (AP)—Mrs. Julia Griffith, who died here recently, left an estate of \$2,500, according to letters of probate filed in the courts here today. She was a sister of Phil Metschan, Portland hotel man.

## Menus Of The Day

**MACARONI AND CHEESE**  
Menu For Dinner  
Macaroni and Cheese  
Buttered Spinach  
Corn Bread  
Pear Salad  
Lemon Torte  
Coffee
- Macaroni And Cheese For 6**  
4 cups cooked macaroni.  
4 tablespoons butter.  
4 tablespoons flour.  
3 cups milk.  
2-3 cup pimento cheese.  
1 teaspoon salt.  
1/4 teaspoon paprika.  
1/2 cup diced, cooked celery.  
2 tablespoons chopped cooked green pepper.

**Cornbread**  
1-3 cups flour.  
2-3 cup corn meal.  
4 teaspoons baking powder.  
1-3 teaspoon salt.  
5 tablespoons sugar.  
1 egg.  
1 cup milk.  
3 tablespoons fat, melted.  
Mix ingredients and beat 2 minutes. Pour into shallow, greased pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Cut in bars and serve warm.

**Pear Salad**  
1 package lemon flavored gelatin mixture.  
1 cup pear juice.  
2-3 cup boiling water.  
1 cup diced pears.  
1/2 cup diced celery.  
1/4 teaspoon salt.  
Pour water over gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add pear juice and cool and chill until little stiff. Add rest of ingredients. Pour into mold and chill until stiff. Unmold on lettuce and surround with salad dressing.

**Lemon Torte**  
1 cup fine bread crumbs.  
1 cup sugar.  
3 egg yolks.  
1/4 teaspoon salt.  
3 tablespoons lemon juice.  
2 tablespoons grated lemon rind.  
3 tablespoons flour.  
1 teaspoon baking powder.  
1 egg white, beaten.  
Mix crumbs, sugar, yolks, salt, juice and rind. Mix well. Add rest of ingredients, mixing lightly. Pour into shallow, buttered pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Crumble or serve cut in squares. Top with plain or whipped cream.

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
