

DIPLOMAT MELLON STILL MUST THINK FINANCE

Economic Problems Face Him In London

WASHINGTON (AP)—For leadership in the struggle at home and abroad against the forces of economic adversity, President Hoover has commended the services of two of the nation's "elder statesmen."

One is a banker turning diplomat and the other is a diplomat returned to banking. Andrew Mellon, the 76-year-old conservative financier, leaves one of the world's biggest banking jobs to take the key ambassadorial post at London where the critical problem of war debt adjustment presses for solution.

And the man he replaces is the brusque 66-year-old Charles Gates Dawes who has been called back from his diplomatic work to fight in the home trenches for business revival as head of the reconstruction finance corporation.

Understands Economic Problems

Mellon goes from the custodianship of the treasury to the Court of St. James at a time when President Hoover says economic and other critical international problems demand wise solution in the interest of the United States.

Mellon's long leadership in the government's fiscal problems and his recent European experiences in the delicate negotiation of the Hoover moratorium are regarded as peculiarly fitting him for his new position.

Aboard last summer either by chance or design when the complex questions surrounding the deferment of reparations payments were being thrashed out, his participation in the discussion was appraised

both by the administration and by the statesmen of Europe as "most helpful."

Mellon already is widely known and esteemed in official circles in England and the continent. In addition to a long-standing reputation abroad as an American financial leader, he has widened his acquaintance by frequent trips to Europe, spending many months at a time in France and England.

In the European mind he typifies—probably more so than any other of our envoys of recent years—the American elder statesmen, the conservative, courtly leader of finance and industry.

An Art Connoisseur

As a civilian only, the social doors over there would be wide open to him. His reputation as an art connoisseur is international.

State Grangers File New Water Power Measure

SALEM, Feb. 11 (AP)—The state grange Wednesday filed a substitute initiative petition for the proposed constitutional amendment regulating water power in Oregon in which the language is clarified and several changes made in the original petition, now abandoned. The initiative will be submitted to the attorney general for ballot title and if 17,088 names are secured before July 8, it will appear on the ballot at the November election.

Under the new initiative the state of Oregon is authorized and empowered to not only control, and develop the water and water power within the state, but has a right to lease

power sites and sell and distribute electric power.

The revised initiative provides a safety clause excluding from the operation of the amendment the appropriation and use of water for beneficial purposes, and providing that existing laws regulating these waters be not changed.

The original petition provided in the main that the rights, title and interest in and to all water, water power and water power sites which the state now has or hereafter may acquire, shall be held by it in perpetuity. It further provides regulations for control and development separately or in conjunction with the United States, with other states or political subdivisions of this state.

Bonus Advocates To Have Hearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11 (AP)—Representative Rainey of Illinois, the Democratic leader, announced Wednesday that advocates of a bill to immediately pay the soldiers bonus in full would be given a hearing by the house ways and means committee after it disposes of the tax bill.

Asked if the bill would be approved by the committee, Rainey replied: "Well, now, that is another matter."
