RESIGNATIONS RUMORED  
PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12 (AP)—The Journal said today it has learned from responsible sources that the resignations of J. G. Ainsworth, chairman of the state highway commission, and William Hanley, commissioner, are in the hands of Governor Julius L. Meier.

Governor Meier said he knew nothing about it.

From what is declared to be a responsible source it was heard that Ainsworth submitted his resignation while the governor was on his recent eastern trip, and that Hanley placed his on file Thursday.

Neither would comment.

The two commissioners have long been dissatisfied with their relationship with Charles K. Spaulding, of Salem, third member of the commission.

What effect the reported resignations would have on the stand of Commissioner Spaulding caused considerable speculation here.

There was some report that the governor might make a formal call for the resignations of all the commissioners, and then appoint or reappoint those whom he feels have the best interests of the work at heart and who can work together most harmoniously.

tute for the LaFollette-Costigan bill. The substitute would provide for loans to states instead of outright gifts as carried by the original proposal.

Both bills now carry \$750,000,000 to be divided equally between road construction and relief.

Compromise Considered  
Another possible compromise is receiving the consideration of those leading the movement for federal aid.

Offered by Senator Wagner, Democrat, New York, it proposed to advance relief funds to the states out of future road appropriations.

The Wagner bill would give \$375,000,000 to the states for relief, reimburse the federal treasury by cutting down highway appropriations beginning with 1937.

The senate approached a vote on the proposal yesterday but there was a renewed outburst of debate which sent the balloting over until today. The agreement to defer the vote again was reached at conferences before today's session.

PLEADS FOR DIRECT RELIEF  
WASHINGTON, Feb. 12 (AP)—Another powerful plea for direct federal help for the unemployed was made in the senate today by one of its outstanding Republican independents—Johnson of California.

Joining Borah of Idaho in advocacy of the LaFollette-Costigan measure, the outspoken Californian demanded that congress accord to suffering human beings the same measure of assistance he said had been given banks and business.

He made his speech in the resumption of debate which followed an informal agreement that a vote would be had on the bill Monday.

Shortly after he concluded, however, an attempt to set a time for a vote failed when Senator Thomas, Democrat, Oklahoma, objected that he had some more to say on the measure and such an agreement might prevent him from saying it.

Johnson said he realized the situation in such that the reconstruction measures undertaken might be essential, but he argued that at the same time relief should not be de-

nied to human beings in distress. "You have legislated in behalf of banks and railroads," he shouted, "now some of us demand that you legislate in behalf of babies and unprotected women too."

"Are you going to recognize the trouble that has come to us the last few years in relation to business and deny it in relation to human beings?"
