

OREGON CONQUERS COUGARS 34 TO 32

Crowd Thrilled at Cage Battle—Washington Defeats Idaho 40-35.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 13 (AP)—Surprising anything in the way of excitement seen here since the Webfoots won a basketball conference championship, the lowly Oregon quintet thrilled a great crowd here last night as they conquered the conference leaders, Washington State, by a 34 to 32 count.

From three points behind at the start of the game, Oregon staged a desperate battle. The entire Oregon team played great ball, but Henry Levoff, slender guard, was the hero of the game. He led the scorers with 13 points and it was his pair of clever field goals that gave Oregon a 4 to 3 advantage after the Cougars scored their three points as the game opened. With only 50 seconds remaining before the ending of the game, Levoff was fouled by Bull Holsten, Cougar forward. Everything depended on Levoff's efforts. He stepped calmly up to the foul line and converted the point.

Oregon led 19 to 11 at the half. The Cougars, desperate, tried all their tricks in the last few minutes of play, but to no avail. Every Oregon player was at his best.

HUNKIES DOWN VANDALS SEATTLE, Feb. 13 (AP)—University of Washington quintet defeated Idaho 40 to 35 here last night to continue in the race for northern division coast conference championship honors. The Hunkies got off to an 8 to 0 lead with Cairney, Putter and Hanover connecting with the basket and managed to stay in front all the way. The Hunkies led 21 to 14 at the 17.

Prices Go Higher On Curb Market

NEW YORK, Feb. 13 (AP)—The improvement in security prices struck the curb market with force fully today, sending leading stocks sharply upward in a substantially augmented turnover.

Shorts in a number of issues found themselves badly trapped and had to cover at substantially higher prices. All groups participated in the strong move, although gains were best in industrial specialties. Transactions approximated 350,000 shares for the two-hour market.

Gains of 1 to 3 points net were numerous in all groups, Electric Bond & Share closed at 12 1/2, up 1/2. In the oil field soared 4 and Humble nearly 3.

Believe Lack Of Enforcement Is Hurting Prices

PORTLAND, Feb. 13 (AP)—Lack of general enforcement of the state butter grading and branding law is causing considerable confusion in the local market and is keeping prices down for some of the better grade offerings.

Market for butter is showing no change for the weekend session of the produce exchange. Prices on the open market are likewise unchanged. Butterfat price is also stationary.

Make of butter is showing a loss on the coast but continues seasonably liberal east of the Rockies.

There was again no change in the general price in the egg trade for the weekend. Storage operations are now being carried on generally along the coast and are taking care of the surplus.

In the chicken trade general steadiness is continued in the price list with demand still best for the lowest priced offerings. Mediums continue a trifle weak. Capons are scarce.

There is a very good movement of country killed lamb. Supplies are of fair volume while demand keeps the trade well cleared from day to day. No late price change.

After the late famine, there are again sufficient root vegetable supplies now arriving to take care of trade wants. Demand is good and especially so for carrots. Spinach, however remains very scarce.

Smelt, avoid cowlick. Just what is keeping the big school of Columbia river smelt out of the Covvits is the big mystery in the trade. What is keeping the school within sight of the same river is also a mystery. In the meantime gillnetters of Bainier are getting the fish.

The Oregon law which forces Washington to pay a tax on all crabs sent to this state, is causing a famine of offerings here. Washington interests are sending their crabs elsewhere where they are not bothered by a tax.
