be assistant hostess and Mrs. W. H. Hertzog will present the lesson.

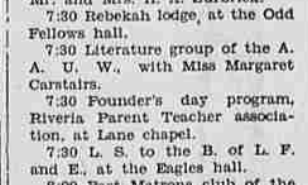

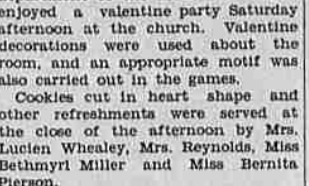

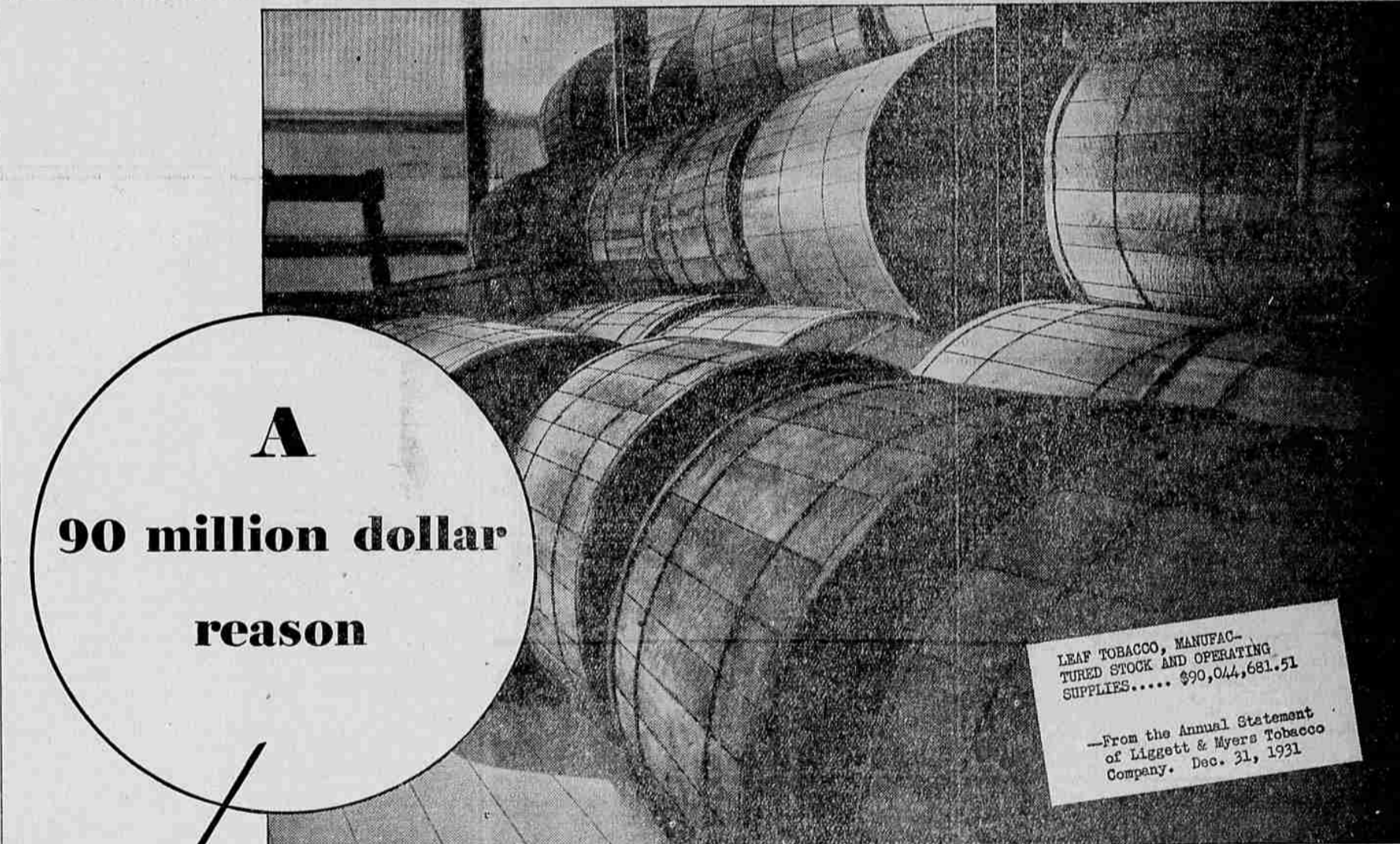
