ELGIN, Ore., Feb. 25 (Special)—The Elgin High school girls basketball team has made a very enviable record this season, meeting all strong teams in this section and winning their games by decisive scores. In two of the games not a field goal was scored against them and in two others only one. In the nine games on their schedule this year the local girls piled up a total of 311 points to their opponents 64. Twenty-three of these points were scored against them by the Enterprise girls in the two games played. This is a record to be proud of and a mark for future Elgin teams to equal or excel, says the Recorder.
