Pinchot Talks With Borah, Johnson Against Renomination of Hoover

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26 (AP)— A campaign against the renomination of President Hoover was discussed yesterday by Governor Gifford Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, with Republican and independent senate leaders. There was a conviction that Pinchot was seriously considering entering the presidential race but he declined to discuss politics with newspaper men. Among those he conferred with were Senators Borah, of Idaho, and Johnson, of California, who have been prominently mentioned as possible opponents of President Hoover. Neither would discuss the conference. As to the Pinchot conference, it is believed neither Borah nor Johnson offered great encouragement to the anti-Hoover campaign, taking the view that it is almost an insurmountable obstacle to defeat a president for renomination. Each has been urged before to get into the race. Also there was every indication that Pinchot urged Borah and Johnson to go into the campaign themselves. The Idaho senator has taken the position that he will make no open campaign; that if his name is put up in states not requiring the consent of the candidate he will take no notice of it. The Pennsylvania primary is in April. Both Borah and Johnson have been in frequent opposition to the policies of President Hoover.

Other minor slides had been reported in the district in the past few days. The mill at High Point has been closed for some time, but the families had remained there. The bodies recovered were taken to Issaquah. SOVIETS MAKE DEMAND ON JAPS (Continued From Page One) of the ordinary cost and to carry gratis Japanese troops sent to guard the railway. In addition, he called for information about the character of the newly formed Manchurian government. The dispatch to the Tass agency from Peking also said that the Japanese Manchurian forces planned to attack Trans-Baikal province, the eastern terminus of the Chinese Eastern railway, at the same time that the "White" Russian group was to invade Primor province. Karakhan questioned Ambassador Hirota on four points. First, he called attention to the request of the Japanese command at Harbin for 17 troop trains to move soldiers from Imienpo to Pogranichni. He said this request was made "under the pretext of defending the lives of Japanese residents in the latter city," but that it was "not usual, because the troops were expected to be sent to the soviet border." "Such a matter," he said, "is not within the authority of the board of the Chinese Eastern railway and the soviet government would like to know if the request was made with the knowledge of the Japanese government. If it was, the soviet government wants an explanation." Secondly, Ambassador Hirota was told the action of the Japanese military command at Harbin in proposing the contract for reduced rates and free transportation of troops was "of a political character and could not
