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Egg Market Is Stronger; Price Still Unchanged

PORTLAND, Feb. 27 (AP)—Decreasing offerings of eggs in practically all Pacific slope sectors are creating more or less strength in the trade at a time when values are usually receding.

Not only has there recently been a decrease in egg offerings here but the market has shown a loss for some time when compared with this same period a year ago.

Indicating the strength of the trade is the fact that large retail interests have been buying supplies at a discount of 1 to 2c from regular quotations, are today gladly paying the full price to get their needs.

Butter Tone Steady
There was a generally steady trade tone for butter for the weekend. On both the Portland exchange and on the open market cubes held former prices for the various classifications. Butter fat steady.

Some of the f. o. b. buyers have again reduced the price of chickens 1c lb. despite the fact that demand is good for all offerings with the possible exception of extremely heavy hens.

Once again the unusual has happened. One leading buyer appeared with an offer of 3c for fancy dressed hen turkeys, a rise of at least 2c from former values and 4c higher than is offered for toms. The latter are quoted as a demand.

There continues a gaining movement in oranges. Demand is naturally keenest for the place and pack offerings because these are to be eliminated from the trade after the turn of the month.

Extremes strength is continued in the market for country killed old crop hogs. Spring stuff is in call but there appears to be no demand after the initial supply about a week ago. Hogs and veal weak.

Further gain in strength is indicated in the price of onions. Locally there remains a general scarcity for No. 2 stock and for boilers, a condition general throughout the Pacific northwest.

Keen Demand Shown
All root vegetables showed a keen demand during the weekend session of the east side farmers' wholesale market. The sale of carrots were 50c 50 lbs with the bulk of trading at the lower mark.

Pumpkins were scarce and moved quickly 50c lug for best.

Cabbage steady at \$1.25 crate for best.

Apple market was loaded with no change in the price and demand for. Hothouse rhubarb offerings were insufficient to take care of needs. Price unchanged.

HEAR RUMORS OF TRUCE
LONDON, Feb. 27 (AP)—A Reuter's news agency dispatch from Geneva this morning stated that rumors were current there that an immediate truce was in prospect at Shanghai.

Japan has addressed an important communication to the league of nations council, the dispatch said, and this may make possible an immediate end of hostilities.

The Reuter's correspondent said it was hoped that truce would be effected and a neutral zone established in the Shanghai area, as an outcome of this new development.

(The Tokyo foreign office disclosed that Japan's representative at Geneva had been directed to inform the league authorities that Japan would accept a truce pact at Shanghai whenever the Chinese prove their willingness to withdraw 12 1/2 miles as specified in the recent Japanese ultimatum.)
