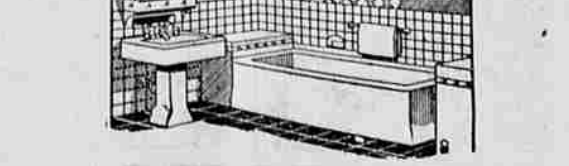

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EIGHT TEAMS TO PLAY AT UNION

District Hoop Champion-ship to Be Decided on March 3, 4 and 5.

UNION, Ore., Feb. 27 (Special)—Union will be the mecca for the basketball fans of Eastern Oregon Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week, the dates set for the ninth annual championship tournament of state district No. 1, Oregon High School Athletic association.

The eight best teams from four counties—Union, Baker, Walla and Malheur—will participate in this big event, the winner of which will go to Salem to compete in the state basketball tournament.

The officials of the tournament will be Robinson and Hickock, referees; Peare, timer and Skiff, scorer. Robinson and Hickock are from Idaho, and are new officials this year.

The district board is composed of E. D. Towler of La Grande, L. Hollenberg of Nyssa and Hugh Coleman of Baker. Roy Conklin of Union is the manager.

The tournament has been well supported in the past by local people, and the management hopes that the patronage of the community will be up to the mark set in former years.

Union is fortunate in being selected, year after year, as the place for holding the tournament. It means much to the town in many ways, and is entitled to a full measure of support as the hands of our people.

Trophies for the two best teams and the best player are being offered by the Union commercial club.

A sub-tournament will select the three teams from the Union-Walla sub-district, while an elimination, based upon the records of the teams in Malheur and Baker counties, will set tie upon four teams from that section.

Union enters the tournament by virtue of a courtesy extended to them by the district board as the host to the other teams.

An interesting tournament is expected this year as no team in the group has escaped undefeated. Even last year's champions, Baker, bowed to opponents in the pre-tournament play.

Basketball fans may have an opportunity to see fifteen games during the tournament should a three-way tie ensue. However, should any team go through the tournament undefeated, there would be but fourteen games.

The plan of the tournament provides for the double elimination plan, which requires that a team lose two games before it is out of the play entirely.

Whitman Cagers Win Northwest Championship

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Feb. 27 (AP)—Whitman college basketball team turned back Walla Walla university, their Northwest conference rivals for championship honors, 48 to 34, to capture the championship here last night. It was Whitman's second straight defeat, having lost Thursday night in a closely contested game, 34 to 30. The final game was exciting throughout, but took a decided turn in Whitman's favor in the last period. Whitman led 23 to 20 at half time.

Buddy Applegate, playing his last game for the Missionaries, was the outstanding star of the deciding contest. He loomed in 12 points. Benjamin, with 12 points and Faber, with 8, flashed offensive class for Whitman. Carpenter and Allen, the latter of whom retired a few minutes before the game closed with a minor injury, were defensive stars for the Bearcats.

men and cattle and sheep growers. Part of the hay is baled and part is chopped. The baled hay in carload lots will sell at \$15 a ton delivered here and the chopped hay in carload lots at \$14.25 a ton. First deliveries will be made next week.

Mr. Donaldson found that about the only hay in the state was in the irrigated district of Umatilla county, and his purchases were made at Standfield and Hermiston. A little while ago Baker county farmers thought they had surplus hay and were offering some for sale, but since then they have become buyers and have taken many tons from the Umatilla district. There is some hay in Southern Washington but freight rates are higher.

About a dozen cars of baled hay have been received in the county already. The Woolgrowers Warehouse company bought two carloads and sold them to J. H. Maxwell and son, Walter, and to Leonard Foster. Walter Maxwell was in town last week directing the hauling of his hay to the upper Chesnimus. It was taken on trucks to the Louis Audet farm and then hauled on sleds the remainder of the distance. Mr. Foster's hay also went into the same district by sleighs. Wade and Hockett also got a car of hay for their cattle.

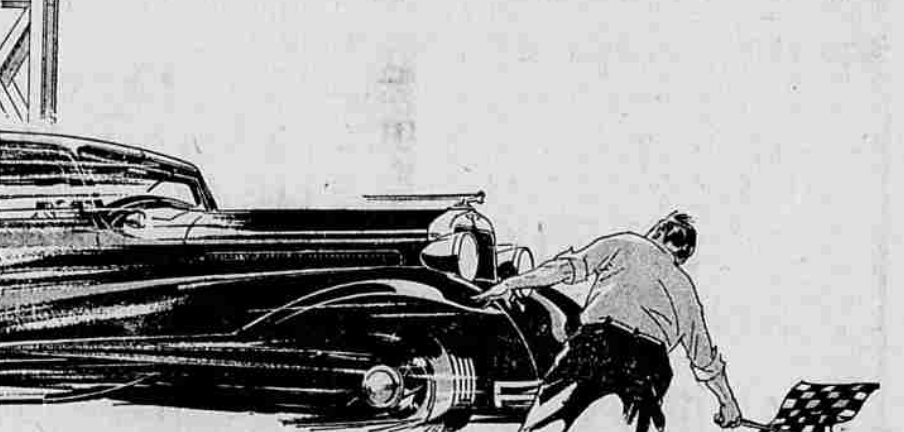


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
