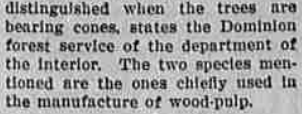

The Garden

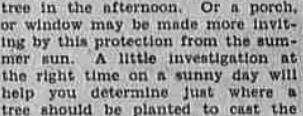
