Greeted by an enthusiastic holiday crowd the new governor general took the oath of office on the family Bible, upon which his father rested his left hand when he was sworn in as president of the United States.

because of his desire to become governor general of the Philippines. "No part of the civilized globe," he said, has seen such progress in the last 30 years as these islands. Urging the need of economic development, Roosevelt declared, "above all we should endeavor to make the islands self-sufficient economically."

"Political relationships between the Philippines and the United States do not come within its scope. These are matters to be decided by the president and congress after consultation with representatives of the Filipino people."

Simultaneously the Philippine civil union, an organization of irreconcilables, adopted a resolution calling for a boycott on American goods if congress adopts a proposed bill to grant independence about 19 years hence.
