Mrs. R. F. Scholz, Dean Of Women At Reed, to Speak

Mrs. Richard F. Scholz, adviser to women at Reed college, Portland, one of the outstanding personalities in the field of education in the state, will address the American Association of University Women at a luncheon

meeting, tomorrow at 12:30 at the La Grande hotel. "Social Experiments in a New Vocation" has been announced as the theme of her talk, which will be of special interest since she recently spent two years studying in Vienna. Miss Helen Moor, president of the La Grande association, states.

Alfred Meyers will furnish a group of solo numbers.

Mrs. Scholz, who graduated from the University of California with a degree in history, is an interesting personality and the widow of Dr. Scholz, whom she married when he was a member of the history faculty at the University of California.

Dr. Scholz was a graduate of the

University of Wisconsin and Rhodes Scholar at Oxford. After an extended tour of Europe in 1914, Dr. and Mrs. Scholz went to the University of Washington where he taught until 1921. At that time he accepted the presidency of Reed college, Portland, an outstanding institution in higher education, a young institution with few traditions and high scholastic standards. Dr. Scholz had become known as a thorough scholar, a man of educational vision and great personal charm, a magnetic teacher.

Mrs. Scholz had been and continued to be his indispensable ally. Together they gave themselves enthusiastically to the educational problems of Reed college. Mrs. Scholz was not less essential to the college than her husband. Her profound understanding of situations and people endeared her to the students as well as to the faculty, and to Portlanders with whom the college brought her in contact, it is said.

After Dr. Scholz's death in 1924, Mrs. Scholz, whose hopes had been indissolubly bound up in Reed, consented to remain as advisor for women, a position she had held unofficially since coming to the college. This decision was of inestimable value to the college, for Mrs. Scholz already held the affectionate regard of the student body and the warmth of her personality enhanced immeasurably her personal influence with the students, according to reports.

In the summer of 1928, Mrs. Scholz took a group of Reed college students on an "Open Road Tour" of Europe, and in July, 1929, she and her family of four children sailed from the Pacific coast via the Panama Canal for Europe, where they spent two years in Vienna. During this period, Mrs. Scholz' three younger children attended school in this old-world center and Mrs. Scholz proved herself an authoritative observer of educational, political and social conditions in middle Europe.

In September, 1931, she returned to Reed college as adviser to women, and conference instructor in the "History of Civilization" course.

Home Interests Studied At Meet

The Oregon conference for the study of home interests will be held in Corvallis on March 9, 10 and 11, sponsored by the Oregon State Agricultural college department of home economics. Several La Grande groups are interested in the conference, including the Parent Teacher association and the American Association of University Women, since discussions of problems of the home, education

of children, child health and many others will be discussed.

Several members of the staff at the Oregon State college will also appear on the program during the three-day conference.

Wednesday morning the opening session of the conference will be held, with Dr. Frank W. Parr, professor of secondary education, at O. S. C., leading the discussion of "The Child's Leisure." "Meeting the Economic Situation" is the theme of the afternoon session, at which time Mrs. Jessamine C. Williams, professor of food and nutrition, will discuss food needs and nutrition. Later in the afternoon Dr. McGinnis will speak on "Freedom For the Child, What Does it Mean?"

"Oregon Homes and the State" will be the theme for the evening session, and President William Jasper Kerr, of O. S. C., and Dean J. B. Jewell, dean of the school of vocational education, will address the group on "Education and Oregon Homes." "Home Guidance of Reading" will be the topic which Miss Loney will discuss, and Mrs. Dunbar will outline "An Oregon Plan For Child Health and Protection."

Thursday morning, Miss Mildred Chamberlain, associate professor of related arts, will speak on "Making the Living Room Liveable." Dr. McGinnis will lead a discussion of "Wholesome Relationships." Meeting the economic situation has been selected as the theme for Thursday afternoon, and Miss Johnson, will discuss "Reducing Expenditures as a Means of Reducing Costs." Professor E. W. Warrington, professor of religion, will discuss the religious education of children.

In the evening the theme will be "progress in the state program in child development and parent education," reported by Mrs. Johnson, A. A. U. A.; Mrs. Brie, P. T. A.; Mrs. Wright, public school; Miss Charles Nye, extension service; and Miss Johnson, school of home economics.

Addresses which will be given on Friday are by Miss Nye, who will discuss housing and family life as reported by the president's conference on home building and home ownership; Miss Maud Wilson, professor of home economics research, discussing "Houses of 1930;" Dr. McGinnis, "New Findings in the Field of Child Development;" and during the morning, development of the program, includes a talk, "Keeping Up Appearances," by Miss Alma Fritchett, professor of clothing and related art; "Helping Children to Make Successful Adjustments," by Miss Johnson.

A conference for high school teachers of home economics will follow the conference on Saturday morning.

Urge Trapping of Moles

The best way to get rid of moles in lawns and gardens is to trap them, says the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture. If there are only a few, good results may be obtained by dropping moth balls in the runways at the edge of lawn or a field.

Peat as Fuel

In its natural state peat contains as high as 90 per cent of moisture and, to make it satisfactory fuel, it must be dried as much as possible. It is almost impossible to eliminate moisture entirely from peat, and thus it burns with a slow, smoldering fire and produces very little smoke.

Setting Off the Home

The area between house and barn, if attractive, sets off a home as very few things can. No matter how fine the house may be or even how well kept the barn, if this twilight zone between house and barn is not made and kept attractive the homestead will have lost much of its beauty and charm.—Farm Journal.

Flight of Ducks and Geese

Many conflicting reports have been made as to how fast ducks and geese fly. Since the advent of the automobile and airplane it is possible to time them more accurately. Ducks and geese do not usually travel at a rate of more than 40 miles an hour. A duck hawk has been timed, however, which flew at a speed of 165 to 180 miles an hour when chasing prey. Canada geese were timed at 44 miles an hour and a brant at 40 miles an hour.
