

RUSSIA NOW FEARS JAPAN WILL ATTACK

ders," the newspaper said. "We cannot ignore the fact that responsible representatives of Japanese military and non-military circles openly have raised the question of a raid on the soviet union and annexation of border provinces."

The newspaper then quoted documents which it attributed to unidentified Japanese officials:

"I consider it necessary," said one of these documents, "to assume a firm policy with relation to the soviet union and to be ready to start war at any moment. The first purpose of such a war must be not only to protect Japan against communism, but to occupy the soviet far east and Eastern Siberia."

Another document quoted said: "Taking into consideration the armed forces of the soviet union, we must begin soon. Any delay would make conditions more favorable for them and I consider it necessary that the empire start a war against the soviet union as quickly as possible. There must be propaganda to attract the western neighbors of the soviet union so that it may be destroyed inside and outside by means of the white guards and other anti-soviet elements."

A third such document said: "Considering the present conditions, we may conclude that the soviet union is unable to carry on a war at this time. The present is very favorable for our empire to decide the problem of the far east."

These documents, said Izvestia, "compel us to pay strict attention to everything that is happening in the far east."

Izvestia recalled that two months have passed without an answer to the Russian proposal for a pact of non-aggression with Japan, and it described as "significant" the movement in Japan "looking toward violation of the fishing concessions in the soviet far east."

"Actually," said Izvestia, "this movement has nothing to do with fishing but is only another expression of the anti-soviet elements who would like to have free action in far eastern waters in their plans for aggression."

"Neither can responsible Japanese circles evade responsibility for the anti-soviet activities of the white guards in Manchuria despite their claim that they know nothing about these activities. We could cite numerous proofs that these activities are directly connected with the Japanese occupation of Manchuria."

"These facts indicate the increasing danger of aggression against the soviet union from Manchuria, requiring vigilance on our part and necessary measures of defense."

you to take your eyes off this mirage the Japanese are throwing up."

"Just now I received telegrams that the Japanese are still advancing, their transports pouring fresh troops into the fighting, even to a point 40 miles west of Shanghai. The defenders of the fort at Wosung were killed to the last man."

"Now I insist that this assembly take measures to assure cessation of these hostilities and arrangement of a formal armistice."

M. Sato said the troops of which Dr. Yen complained were Japanese reinforcements which had started from Japan before the fighting was halted and which no doubt would soon be returned. He was interrupted by laughter from the spectators' gallery.

Paul Hymans, Belgian chairman, asserted that everybody agreed something had to be done to stop the conflict, and he adjourned the meeting to a resolution embodying the attitude of the assembly might be drafted.

Fighting Ceases

The war which never was declared seemed to have ended in the Shanghai area today with an undeclared armistice.

Stores were opening, soldiers put away their bayonets and got out their shovels to repair the wreckage, and the Chinese army had fallen back almost to Soochow.

A report from Tientsin said fighting was going on there but it was believed to be a minor skirmish.

In Manchuria a delegation went down to Port Arthur again to bring back Henry Pu-Yi, former boy emperor, who is to be installed March 9 as head of independent Manchuria.

Source of Cocaine
