

BEARS NOSE OUT HUSKIES 22 TO 21

Series For Coast Conference Title Sees California in Role of Victor

OAKLAND, Cal., Mar. 5 (AP)—Beaten in the last 30 seconds of play last night when Jack Read's long, slender arms hoisted the ball through the net to give the University of California basketball team a 22-21 victory, the University of Washington today faced the task of winning tonight's game or relinquishing the conference title.

In the opening game of the Pacific Coast conference championship series last night, the Huskies fought a long uphill battle, and with four minutes to go, earned a one point lead. Their stalling tactics failed when Read's final shot whipped through the net after his teammates upset the generalship of the north-erners.

If California wins tonight, she will take the title the Huskies won by defeating the blue and gold team in two out of three games at Seattle last year. Should Washington win, a third game will be played Monday here.

Starting lineups for tonight's game probably will include only one change, coaches indicated. Ted Ohashi, Japanese guard, likely will replace John Crowley, Clarence Price, Bear mentor.
