Mrs. R. F. Scholz
Honored During
La Grande Visit

Mrs. Richard F. Scholz, dean of women at Reed college, and one of the foremost women educators in the state, was a weekend guest of the La Grande branch of the American Association of University Women, and during her stay was extensively entertained. She was the main speaker at a luncheon meeting of the group Saturday at noon.

Mrs. Scholz Gives
Talk at Luncheon

An educator who went to Vienna on a vacation, and spent two years observing the new Vienna which has replaced that gay pre-war city is Mrs. Richard F. Scholz, dean of women at Reed college, who spoke on "Social Experiments in a New Vienna" before 43 members and guests of the American Association of University Women, Saturday at 12:30 at the La Grande hotel.

In 1917 it was ruled by the Hapsburg family and was first the center of the Holy Roman empire and then of the Austrian empire. The people remained strongly nationalistic, and since their spirit of nationalism was sustained all liberal movements struck a snag in that country in the struggle with the old monarchic ideas.

The war broke out in 1914, and Bohemia and Hungary, important divisions of the Austrian empire, wanted to be independent. Mrs. Scholz pointed out, just before the close of the war, Austria formed a republic and asked the king to abdicate, democracy was rampant there and universal suffrage was extended to all the people.

houses for 80,000 families, and a very small rental is charged, sufficient for the upkeep and repair of the houses. They are accompanied by space for gardens, courts where the children can play and the adults spend their leisure time. There are still 25,000 on the waiting lists for apartments in the new light and clean tenement houses, which are kept in good condition through the inherently clean tendencies of the Austrians, Mrs. Scholz said.

Since 1918, the children of Austria have been starving, and in 1918-1920 one of the greatest educational renaissance in history was brought about through new laws made by the Vienna governments. All children have eight years of education in the public schools, when they learn the history of their environment as well as mathematics, science, Latin and other studies which American children learn in high schools. The teaching methods and curricula were unified and they inaugurated a "doing program." Mrs. Scholz pointed out, many teachers starved to death getting the new schools underway. Among the teachers, 80 per cent are men and have an advanced degree of philosophy or have been trained in the special teacher training school.
