week has carried the pound up more than 16 cents, absorbed all offerings made by the British treasury, which was said to be eager to hold the price down. "The world has turned bullish on sterling," was the explanation advanced by one banker for the sudden buying movement. In addition to already known factors accounting for the recent change in sentiment, such as Britain's recent payment of \$400,000,000 of foreign credits, it was explained that Britain had completed its work of setting up foreign balances to meet debt requirements, and cessation of this operation had lifted pressure on the pound. In addition, the movement of French balances to Paris were said to have abruptly ended, with a sudden reverse flow of money developing, when it became apparent that England's financial position had improved.
