

GEHRINGER BIG "IF" AT DETROIT

If Second Sacker Comes Through, Harris Expects His Club to Go Good.

(Note: This is the third of a series of first hand stories on major league prospects.) By Russell J. Newland (Associated Press Sports Writer) SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 9 (AP)—The big "if" in the baseball plans of the Detroit Tigers this season centers on Charlie Gehringer and his return to form.

Thus far in training, Gehringer has given every indication he will be ready for the baseball wars. If he is, Skipper Harris says the Tigers may be a "surprise team." And if he isn't ready, the Detroit pilot has a couple of words for it: "We're sunk!"

Need His Punch "We need Gehringer's punch at the plate and his steadiness at second. The same goes for Dale Alexander. Big 'Alex' could improve his work around first base but he doesn't need any lessons in standing up to home plate."

Harris has no exaggerated ideas as to what the Tigers will do in the American league scramble. Pennant possibilities are too remote to discuss, he says, but if the team clicks at all he expects to make a better showing than the seventh place of last year.

A pitching staff fortified with veterans and boasting several young prospects, is the high spot of the club. Tom Bridges, with the team last season, is in a Palo Alto hospital with the "flu" at present.

One big experiment may furnish the squad with a new moundman. Mark Koenig, who already has served as an infielder, Harris says Koenig has everything a pitcher needs, including a fast ball, and that it now is only a matter of control.

Bill Rogell, acquired from Toronto last year, appears to have climbed the shortstop position. Four candidates are battling for third base. Nolan Richardson, up from Toronto last season, finished the year at the "hot corner" and has first call at present with Bill Rhipe, up from Portland of the Coast league and Henry Schuble, from Beaumont, furnishing the chief opposition.

The fastest indoor mile ever walked, 6:27 1/5, has just been registered by Mike Pecora after the old mark had stood 20 years, but the outdoor pedestrian record of 6:25 1/2 still stands to the credit of George Goulding of Canada.
