COYOTE TRAILING SKI-PLANS EASES WORK FOR HUNTERS CHADRON, Neb. (AP)—What chance has the poor coyote when A. H. Waterson and D. T. Skiles get after him with their ski-plane?

Armed with subguns, these young men patrol the snow-covered Nebraska prairies in search of coyotes, valuable for their pelts as well as for bounties.

They swoop down on their prey, giving it "both barrels," and are able, by virtue of skis attached to their landing-gear, to land, load the carcass into the plane, and go on with the hunt.

In three days of the sort of hunting in sub-zero weather they bagged 12 pelts in a couple of hours flying each day. They receive an average of \$6 each for the pelts.

Our only interest is in his immediate and safe return and we feel certain that the kidnapers will realize that this interest is strong enough to justify them in having complete confidence and trust in any promises that we may make in connection with his return.

We urge those who have the child to select any representative that they desire to meet a representative of ours who will be suitable to them at any time and at any place that they may designate.

If this is accepted, we promise that we will keep whatever arrangements that may be made by their representative and ours strictly confidential, and we further pledge ourselves that we will not try to injure in any way those connected with the return of the child.

Hopewell, N. J., Mar. 9 (AP)—It is over a week—and dust films the toys in the silent nursery of the Soudrland hills.

The baby? There has been no word of his whereabouts. No word.

Date Filled Cookies 1 cup fat 2 cups sugar 2 eggs 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 teaspoon mulling 3 tablespoons cream 4 cups flour 1 teaspoon cream of tartar

Cream the fat and sugar. Add eggs, vanilla, nutmeg and cream. Beat 1 minute. Add flour and cream of tartar. Chill dough. Roll out very thin and spread 1/4 mixture with date mixture. Roll other half over on top and press down. Use sharp knife and cut 1 1/2 inch squares. With a spatula carefully remove squares to greased baking pan. Press edges with fork to prevent filling from coming out. Prick tops of cookies with fork. Bake 12 minutes in moderate oven.

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Two American Women Physicians Quit Liuhoo and Go To Shanghai

By Morris J. Harris (Associated Press Staff Correspondent) SHANGHAI, Mar. 9 (AP)—Two American women physicians, Dr. Grace I. Crandell and Dr. Ross W. Palmberg, both of Milton, Wisconsin, have defied finally the entreaties of their friends and returned to Shanghai in safety from the Grace hospital at Liuhoo where they have been assisting in caring for wounded soldiers.

They were brought in by automobile Tuesday, their nerves frayed by the roar of airplanes overhead and the rattle of death-dealing machine guns in the sky, by H. E. Davis, treasurer of the Seventh Day Baptist mission which operates the hospital. The two women recounted a vivid story of tense hours during the Japanese bombardment and subsequent occupation of Liuhoo.

"It was the uncertainty," Dr. Palmberg said, explaining the fear that gripped them and their Chinese assistants as the airplanes repeatedly swooped low over the hospital on the afternoon of March 1. That was the day the Japanese troops were landed. Streams of lead were poured into the adjacent city.

The first inkling they had of the Japanese attack, she said, was in the morning when a Japanese war vessel in the Yangtze, three miles away, started shelling Liuhoo. The shells exploded less than 100 yards from the hospital.

This was the signal for the beginning of the withdrawal of the Chinese which was speeded up by the incessant machine gun strafing and bombing from the planes.

"We were thoroughly frightened," Dr. Palmberg continued. "The planes came very low overhead and the rattle-tat of the machine guns was nerve wracking in the extreme."

Under cover of darkness the two women and the remnant of their staff evacuated the hospital and spent the night at the home of Chinese friends, a mile out in the country. The next day the little party started for a point 20 miles westward but turned back when they learned they would have to pass through the front lines of both armies to reach their destination.

LARGE CREW WIPED OUT BY EXPLOSION (Continued From Page One) One man escaped from the purifying box without injury prior to the blast. Residences for blocks were shaken. The scene of the explosion is a mile from the central city area. The blast was made harrowing by the cries of relatives of the doomed men. Police roped off the streets a block from the gas tank. Hundreds of spectators blocked the thoroughfares beyond the ropes. Blast Tremendous A tremendous roar announced the accident while practically all the workmen, many earning their first pay in weeks, were trapped below. A fierce torrefactive flame which followed was speedily extinguished by the firemen and the search within the chambers was begun. The tank is a square steel structure 20 by 20 feet and 15 feet deep raised from the ground on steel girders 15 feet in height. Within it is separated into upper and lower compartments braced by many girders and longitudinally divided into east and west chambers. The metal interior was coated with a mixture of charcoal, sawdust and sulphuric acid and other acids used in purifying the gas which is then piped across the street to a distributing tank. In the sawdust composition gas collects. Several times a year it is necessary to clean it and the workmen who had done this work before commented today on the unusually heavy accumulation. On the outside of the tank a stairway like a fire escape and a small open elevator provide means of entry for the workmen and the removal of the old purifying material. The elevator also is used to carry up the new mixture with which the walls are coated.
