

Northwest Apple Movement Gains; Export Call Off

CORVALLIS, Ore., Mar. 9 (AP)—Increased domestic movement of northwest boxed apples through eastern chain store channels during the past week was noted in the fruit and vegetable review issued today by the O. S. C. extension service and the U. S. D. A. Bureau of agricultural economics.

Backed by an aggressive campaign by western apple interests, the review said, distributors are concentrating on active movement at current low prices. Meanwhile foreign demand has fallen off sharply, influenced by the near arrival of Australian new crop apples.

"Buy British" campaigns and the new import duties or other trade restrictions abroad, likewise have influenced the trade.

Carlott movement of Douglas county spring cauliflower has again been delayed by adverse weather but shipment is expected soon. The crop is estimated at one hundred carloads plus a liberal truck movement.

The weekly review issued today shows the greatest shortage in the Klamath region where prices have mounted as high as \$16 in the stack, doubling the fall figure. Walla Walla alfalfa is going at \$10 baled, f. o. b. track. Hay supplies are scarce in Central California but the new crop of green feed farther south has eased the market there.

Butter and Egg Markets Showing Little Change

PORTLAND, Mar. 9 (AP)—Very erratic weather conditions appear an influence in the market for butter at midwest and eastern points but little change is reflected in the local situation.

Some of the makers have been unable to fill their regular trade wants and have been compelled to go into the open market for some of their daily needs. This in itself reflects a strong tone.

Butterfat values are steady to firm in consequence.

There was no change in the general egg market situation for the day. Local co-ops reported prices stationary as did most of the private operators. Receipts continue heavy.

There remains an acute shortage of light weight hens with prices firm to higher. A leading dealer reported that the bulk of the demand from retailers is for the lights on account of the low price.

Market for turkeys shows more or less dullness with practically no change in the price. Hens are moving fairly well but without the snap of a week or 10 days ago.

There is an acute shortage of local carrots which is becoming worse. Demand is keen and prices unusually high. Reports indicate considerable stocks unsold up the Willamette valley could be profitably moved to Portland.

There are greater arrivals of broccolis from Roseburg and quality and size are improving. Sales are being made by retailers mostly around \$1.00 a 25 lb. crate for best stock. The California selling season is expected to be over here within a few days.

Lower prices are being named for asparagus generally. Sales of green stock are reported generally 15 to 18c lb. with late carload stuff at the higher mark. Quality generally favorable.

Market for onions continue to drift here and at country points with no late carload business at the source to speak of since the recent buying at \$5.35 central, sacks and twine.

Notes of wholesale trading:

Potatoes trade is slightly more active but most of the demand is for 2s. Imperial valley peas more plentiful with the price off around 2c lb.

Offerings aside from apples, were scant today on the east side farmers' market. Demand was good in practically all lines with little change in the price list.

Carrots continued in chief request with sales mostly 65c lug for top quality.

Good cabbage was in call; mostly \$1.25 crate.

Apples sold within the late low price range but the call was good.

Roseburg broccolis was offering around \$1.10 crate.

Country killed lambs are firm for all crop with new crop scarce and in call.

Veal and hogs are steady to active. Walla Walla spinach is scarce here but the trade is being taken care of by increasing local stock as well as Texas and California offerings.

Cucumber market continues over-loaded and inclined to weakness.

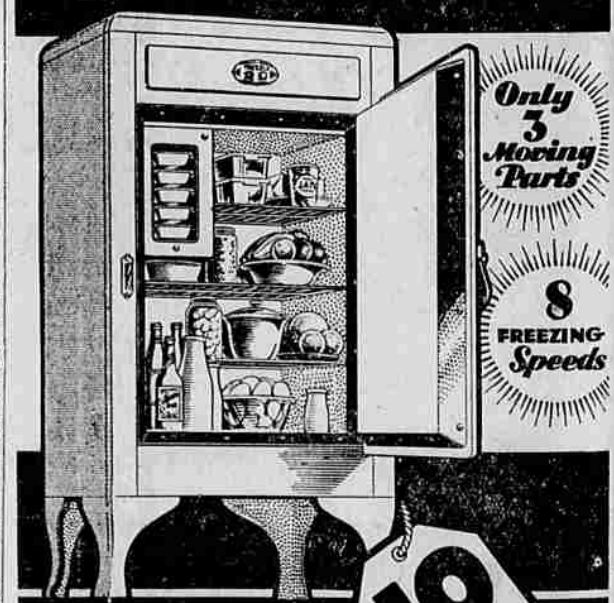
