DRUGS

Some are "agin" and some are for drugs, but those who know most about them have a different attitude.

Some patients actually boast that they never have their prescriptions filled, and proclaim that they are against pills and powders.

Others think that no visit to the doctor is complete or satisfactory unless they have carried away with them that charm-like script, the prescription.

The fact of the matter appears to be that, while the public is buying and consuming more and more drugs, physicians are using a relatively smaller number. But these are being employed with greater fitness.

Fifty years ago prescriptions contained many drugs. They were called shot gun prescriptions. They were employed on the general conviction that if the number of drugs was sufficiently large, one of them at least would hit the mark.

Pharmacology, the science of drugs, has made great strides during the last half century in studying their effects.

The result has been that inert and ineffective drugs have been eliminated from the official list, and prescriptions simplified.

Only a few drugs cure diseases. These are the so-called specifics. Most drugs are employed to aid the body in overcoming disease, or in correcting faulty physiology.

Certain drugs are invaluable aids in the treatment of disease, but most of those used by the average person in self-treatment for minor ailments could be profitably replaced by such agents as heat, cold, massage, rest and baths.

There is, therefore, no warrant for the attitude of the drug nihilist, and only a little for that of the drug enthusiast.

Drugs are tools. They have a limited sphere of application, but are very useful in given conditions. They are not without danger when employed by those lacking adequate training and experience.

Fatigue Antitoxin

According to a German scientist, fatigue is caused by a poison, which he has isolated and from which he has prepared an antitoxin that seems to increase energy.
