

This Game of Golf

Willie Macfarlane strolled out on the turf a few yards from the Palma Ceia clubhouse and swung his driver twice.

"Practice is all over," he said. He was headed for the first tee of his first match in the Gasparilla open tournament at Tampa.

"You're not going to hit any shots?" I inquired.

"Not till the match starts," said Willie. "I've never been able to see the good of it—for me, anyway. I can tell by swinging a club if I'm swinging it right. I don't have to knock any balls round with it."

"If I'm swinging right, it's O. K. If I'm not—well, when I used to expend a lot of energy hitting practice shots, I don't remember that I ever got to swinging better. Usually it was worse. Funny game, golf. When you're right, you're right, and when you're not, you're wrong, and that's that. So I don't waste any more time and energy hitting a lot of practice shots."

Willie did very well, at Palma

Ceia. He divided the money for the low qualifying score with Dick Metz, half his age, each producing a 67 and a 69 on the par-70 course. He defeated Herman Barron, 1 up; Basil Brooke, 4-3; Eddie Schultz, 5-4; and Wild Bill Mehlhorn, 1 up, in 18-hole bouts on his way to the finals with Paul Runyan, who won the match, 3-1.

Prophet's Fate

The Big Shots were on the spot early, for the most part, in the first Gasparilla open, and their fate induced the reflection that medal play retains one great advantage over match play, at the gate.

The Big Shots almost invariably are in the running, or at least in the field, until it is all over.

Showing what a brilliant, minor prophet this correspondent is, I fancied I could see Sir Walter Hagen and Gene Sarazen in the finals. When the draw came out, with Walter in the top bracket and Gene in the lower, the prospect brightened a bit.

I also said, and was quoted liberally in a Tampa newspaper, that I considered Sarazen the most formidable golfer in the United States today. I still say so. But Gene was defeated in the first round of the Gasparilla affair, by Eddie Schultz, who was not driving within 40 yards of Gene, and was cutting them a bit, at that.

Gene Switches Clubs

Sarazen, let me observe, is hitting the ball about 20 yards farther from the tee than I have ever seen him; and his iron play, making due allowance for the sandy Florida turf—which does not suit his style at all—is equally impressive.

Gene has made a small change in

the structure of his clubs which is interesting. The clubs are a good deal heavier, for one thing, than those he used last year and the year before. They take a deal of swinging. But the stocky little Italian can furnish it.

The change in structure is at the top of the grip, where most clubs nowadays have a little bulge, to fit into the "heel" of the left hand. All Gene's clubs are carefully flattened off, along that bulge, just where the shaft comes against the "heel" of the left hand. This causes him to lay hold of the club the same way every time with the left hand—which is the important hand. And it makes the shaft snuggle a bit closer, or so it seems to me.

40 Per Cent Of Teachers Oppose College Football

CHICAGO, Mar. 11 (AP)—A survey has shown that abolition of intercollegiate football at the University of Chicago is favored by 51 per cent of its full professors and 40 per cent of its entire teaching staff, including assistant and associate professors and instructors.

The survey was made through questionnaires by John M. Stalmarck, instructor in the social science department, who announced its results. To a question whether football should be encouraged by inducing good athletes to come to the university, only 9 per cent of the full professors and 17 per cent of all the teachers voted affirmatively.

DISCONTINUE TWO AIRPORTS

PORTLAND, Mar. 11 (AP)—Two government intermediate airfields in this district will be discontinued April 1, according to R. R. Tinkham, district superintendent of lighthouses and airways.

The Woodburn intermediate field will be discontinued because of lack of use and the circumstance that it is 15 miles west of the Portland-Medford airway. The electric code beacon and acetylene runway markers will be taken out of service.

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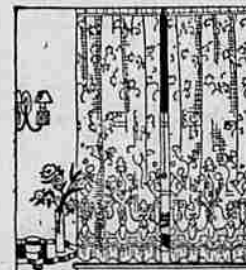

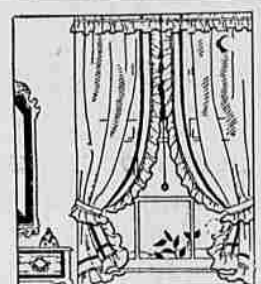

L. F. Allen Will Seek Return To The Legislature

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Mar. 11 (Special)—L. F. Allen announced himself Tuesday a candidate for re-election as representative in the state legislature. The district now consists of Walla Walla county only, and for the first time the county will have its own representative in the state legislature, making the office of importance to the county.

Formerly Walla Walla and Union counties were united in one district. The representative is a Republican and has lived all his life in this county, says the Record-Chief. He

is a druggist at Walla Walla, and is mayor of that city.

Several additional candidates for county offices have entered the lists during the week.

S. A. Enevans has filed for re-election as county commissioner, and his name will be on the Democratic ballot. Duane Lathrop previously filed as a Republican candidate for this office.

Two Republicans have entered the race for county clerk, W. H. Spence and W. J. Ortmann. On the Democratic side, D. B. Reavis, present clerk, is a candidate for re-election. For assessor two additional aspirants have come to the front both on the Republican ticket: W. W. Zuercher and W. D. Ballard. For a rival on their own ticket they have T. P. Lathrop while C. J.
