ENTERTAINMENT (Special) — Great excitement was aroused here Wednesday by a deer brought to the Corner market by Game Warden George Rogers. Word was passed around that a beautiful deer had been shot out of season and George Rogers refused to tell who the guilty party was.

Several portions of its body were quite unusual. The ears were not normal and the front legs were extremely short for a deer. Not many of Wallawa county's hunters, however, were greatly disturbed by these details. As a matter of fact this deer was a fine Jersey calf that had been brought in from J. R. Paugues farm, the head had been dressed out, the feet and lower legs joined had been removed, a pair of antlers placed beneath carcass, and a deer's tail was tied in place.

Market Stiffens Somewhat Today

NEW YORK, Mar. 12 (AP) — The stock market stiffened a little today, as shorts took their rather meager profits. A few shares pushed up to close to a point or so higher, but most changes were fractional.

Trading was extremely listless and turnover was only about half a million shares. The closing tone was steady.

U. S. Steel and General Electric were fractionally higher, and issues up a point or so were Allied Chemical, North American, American Can and Consolidated Gas. Santa Fe and Union Pacific each pushed up more than a point, then yielded part of their gains. Considerable selling came into Kruger and Toli, which yielded fractionally.

Trade in the general market was inclined to look easier.

Due to the almost record breaking low price obtainable for halibut, many fishermen are quitting, according to reports received here. Eastern movement has been curtailed.

With arrivals practically nil, the trade here is seeking country killed spring lambs. Demand for all mutton and lambs has recently shown considerable improvement, likewise the price list. Other meats are at least steady.

Market for hothouse cucumbers is congested here with increasing supplies from various directions on dreary weather conditions are against a free consumptive movement. Prices are steady to easier.

There was a dearth of offerings on the east side farmers' wholesale market. Carrots were very scarce and there was a general scramble for needs. Sales continued at the late high marks.

Parasols were in call with general trading 60c lug.

Bunched carrots sold around 35¢ 50c dozen.

Hothouse rhubarb was in small supply and steady call.

More apples were offered and the price remained at the low mark.

Fancy bunched turnips from Coos river were offered at 75c doz. bunches with slow call.

Cabbage was steady at a spread of \$1.25 to \$1.75 crate for good stuff.

including the governor, have said it was impossible to make such a promise of immunity. Dr. Temple said he would be a dedicated crime legal.

The nearest possible thing to a promise of immunity is Col. Lindbergh's own appeal to the kidnappers in which he promised to meet their terms and to maintain complete secrecy if they would return his child.

Col. Schwarzkopf's bulletin continued: "We have no control or supervision over the activities of Col. Lindbergh or his representatives in any respect."

their own shells, and then covered with a white sauce, specially prepared by Miss Heath. The demonstrators recommended baked oysters either for an entree or as a dish in itself for a simple supper.

Broiled steak from the middle west in quickly prepared but must be prepared carefully in order to retain the juices in the meats. With a very hot oven the steak is broiled for about 8 or 10 minutes and then is ready to serve in true middle western fashion.

Succotash, a mixture of lima beans and corn, sweet potatoes and bacon were two dishes typical of the south, while New England was represented by apricot fritters.

Ice cream and cake. The all-American dessert, ice cream and cake, was also prepared by Miss Heath, who suggested a kind of ice cream new to many, marshmallow. The dessert is made from marshmallows dissolved in milk or coffee over a hot boiler, whipped with one cup of pre-beaten cream and then poured into an automatic refrigerator tray to freeze.

A very simple chocolate cake, using only one egg, was made and when covered with chocolate icing, formed the other ingredient of the all-American dessert.

The first part of the police bulletin, dealing with the immunity question was in direct answer to a question submitted by reporters.

The earlier police procedure of giving information by answers to questions submitted by the press at stated intervals has been abandoned, but questions are still sent in before the bi-daily bulletins to keep police informed as to what phases of the investigation are of current interest to the general public. The bulletins are written with these questions in mind with no attempt to answer them all directly.



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Spears Serious About Offered Wisconsin Post

EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 12 (AP) — The Register-Guard said Friday Dr. Clarence W. Spears, head football coach of University of Oregon "is seriously considering" an offer made by University of Wisconsin to accept a similar position there.

The newspaper said Dr. Spears remarked that Wisconsin made him "a tempting offer" in a telephone conversation Wednesday night. He indicated he would have an announcement to make within three days.

The Register-Guard said the proposed realignment of Oregon's institutions of higher learning, necessitated by decreased revenues, may have some influence in dictating Spears' decision. The paper points out that the board of higher education has decided to discontinue the school of journalism here which has operated 20 years, and has taken away the school of pure science after 54 years of operation, and that accordingly the athletic situation itself may later be changed.

POP WARNER SIGNED UP
PALO ALTO, Cal., Mar. 12 (AP) — Officials of Stanford university announced Friday the board of trustees has approved the retention of Glenn S. "Pop" Warner as head football coach for five years.

Warner's new agreement becomes effective next August.
