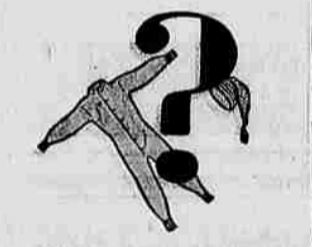
## Towlers Honored At Bridge Party

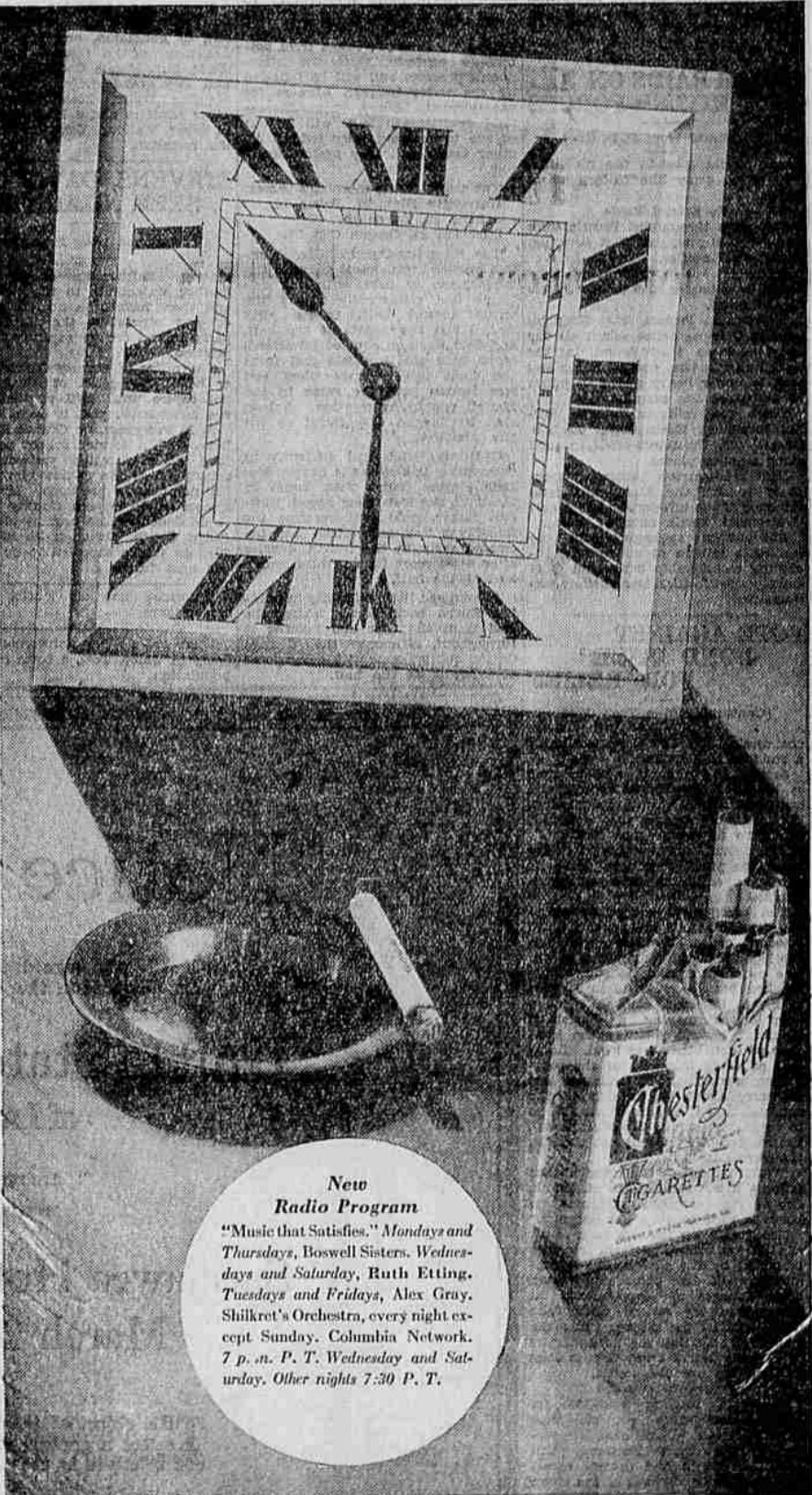
