KIDNAP CASE LATEST CLUE IS WORTHLESS

While Schwarzkopf said investigation of the Lindbergh-Thornburg angle of the case was being continued, investigators working under him let it be known they believed the whole theory had collapsed with discovery of the child.

"The wood from which the ladder was made, they pointed out, could have been easily secured from a hundred places in the region and the child had really been the only thing connecting the disappearance of the Thornburgs with the kidnap case.

The rest of Schwarzkopf's bulletin dealt with angles of the case already proven to be of no value. He spoke of the child held for a time at Creston, Iowa, and said a birthmark on that baby's chest had made it possible definitely to determine it was not the Lindbergh baby, which was not so marked.

He mentioned also a report of four men in a blue sedan with New York license plates who were seen acting in a suspicious manner in Duellen, N. J., the day before the kidnaping.

"This has been thoroughly investigated," he said, "and these people have been seen several times in Duellen since. While probably engaged in some suspicious action it is quite evident this carries no importance in this case."

Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, who were waiting stoically through the dragging days and nights, were reported today to pin their hopes on:

(1) A police belief that Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr., kidnaped 10 days ago, is still alive.

(2) A feeling that when the furor subsides, the kidnapers may negotiate the 20-months-old child's return.

Excitement Dying Down
The world excitement that followed the crime is already dying down. Yesterday newspapermen here sent out by telegraph only 50,000 words. On March 3, at the high price, 240,000 words streamed over the wires.

A high police authority, declaring a belief the child is alive, based it on the contention the kidnapers would be afraid to destroy the infant. It would be just as easy to leave it in a hotel room if the hunt pressed too close, he said.

Although the detective ingenuity lavished on the case, he said, would rival that of any of the master sleuths of fiction or real life, the police are no nearer a solution than they were two weeks ago.

They do not even know, he indicated, whether the world's most noted kidnaping case was the work of professional infant snatchers or amateurs with amazing luck.

Police resumed today the endless task of checking tips and leads.

SUITCASE NOT A CLUE
MALONE, N. Y., March 17 (AP)—State police believed today the suitcase found beside a highway at Duane was not a clue in the Lindbergh kidnaping case.

The suitcase contained baby clothes and the finder reported it to the troopers. Investigation yesterday satisfied them the suitcase was the property of a Saranac Lake taxicab driver. They said he had a wife and child.

WHISTLES BLOWN
PHILADELPHIA, March 17 (AP)—A train whistle blew loud and long today when its valve stuck.

A nearby factory watchman heard and blew his whistle too. Others followed suit and soon there was a din of blowing horns and whistles such as the city seldom hears.

Newspapers were swamped with telephone calls.

"It is true the Lindbergh baby has been found?" they all asked.
